Freedom discovers the "Woman" bound in the underbrush. She symbolizes woman's bound condition by laws and customs.

Then enter the characters Man, Sin, Ignorance and Prejudice, who bind the woman be kept in her state of bondage. But Freedom demands that she be released and knocks on the door of the temple of Justice and asks that Justice come forth and judge. After hearing the woman's entreaty for liberty and the Man's reasons why she should be held in bondage, and after viewing a pageant of the women of achievement of history, Justice orders that the "Woman" be freed.


