

Legislative News In Brief

To Pass On Railroad Fine. The Supreme Court of the United States in a suit brought by the Government against the Missouri, Kansas and Texas railroad will pass on the question of whether a railroad which violates the hours of service law is liable to pay as many penalties as there are employees in the crew.

Nomination Expected Soon. President Wilson is expected to announce soon the name of a successor to Homer N. Boardman as United States Senator for the western district of Oklahoma, who has been removed by Attorney General McReynolds.

Received Many Responses. Ambassador Gerard has informed the Department of State that more than 1,000 favorable responses have been received from German commercial establishments to invitations extended them to send exhibits to the Panama-Pacific Exposition in 1915.

Hearing On Pure Cocos. Is cocoa pure chocolate? And can it be so labeled? These questions are to be determined by the Pure Food Board after a public hearing to be held at the Department of Agriculture November 17. The hearing will be held at the Department of Agriculture, and will last for hundreds of days.

Will Inspect Lock Lumber. To be sure that nothing but genuine greenheart lumber shall enter into the construction of lock sills and docks on the Panama canal, Clayton D. Mell, an expert of the United States Forest Service, is to inspect the lumber to be furnished the canal commission from British Guiana. There are many substitutes for this greenheart, and Mell will draw the specifications, and inspect all timber. Greenheart is more durable than iron or steel in tropical waters, and will last for hundreds of years.

Wilson An Antiquarian. Despite his progressive ideas and his prowess on the golf links, President Wilson is an antiquarian. He has been one in the last twenty-four hours, the American Antiquarian Society in annual session at Worcester, Mass., having elected him to membership in recognition of his historical attainments. Bernard Neill, of Baltimore, professor of history at the Johns Hopkins University, was also elected to membership.

Rifle Matches Begun. Rifle matches for Marine Corps sharpshooters from the barracks along the Atlantic coast have begun at the Washington Barracks. The matches are those from Portsmouth prison, under Lieutenant Shepherd, Portsmouth Navy Yard, Lieutenant Brew, Boston Barracks, Lieutenant Cole, New York Barracks, Lieutenant Astor, Philadelphia Barracks, Lieutenant Coyle, Annapolis Barracks, Lieutenant Stokes, Washington Barracks, Lieutenant Johnson, Norfolk Barracks, Lieutenant Beaulieu, Charleston Barracks, Lieutenant Kingsbury, Winthrop Barracks, Lieutenant Smith, Fort Royal Barracks, Captain Sullivan.

Report On Canal Work. Excavating and concrete work on the Panama canal have been slackened up during the past month, according to the monthly report of the Canal Commission. Only 1,322,713 cubic yards of excavation was done in September, as compared with 2,658,785 the month previous; and but 5,710 yards of concrete laid, compared with 16,728 laid in August.

McAdoo Will Miss Vote. Secretary McAdoo will not go to the home in New York to vote at the November election. The Secretary's home is at Irvington-on-Hudson, in Westchester county, where no important issue is presented.

Views On Tariff Bill. According to Alexander R. Smith, president of the Merchants and Manufacturers' Board of Trade of New York, the 5 per cent clause in the new tariff measure does not prevent the United States from negotiating any existing commercial treaties with foreign nations, though the clause itself provides it shall not be a condition of any treaty. Mr. Smith says a dozen or more foreign na-

tions have at times terminated such treaties with this country, and this country can do the same.

Grateful For Appropriation. The gratitude of the American Red Cross to Congress for the appropriation toward the memorial of the women of the civil war is expressed in a letter from Miss Mabel T. Boardman, who is now in Dublin, Mass. Miss Boardman declares that this memorial, to be linked with the memory of the women who labored so effectively, will be a constant inspiration to our people, recovering from the effects of gratitude to the United States Government and the patriotic and generous citizens who will erect this building.

Senator Lodge Improving. It will be a month before Senator Lodge of Massachusetts can be out, according to dispatches from Boston. He is now in Dublin, Mass. His recovery is considered remarkable.

Brief In Lemon Case. Contending that the Interstate Commerce Commission's blanket rate of \$1 a hundred pounds on lemons from California was fixed with unanimous consent of the railroads now fighting the rate, the Department of Justice today filed its brief in the "Lemon" rate case, before the Supreme Court.

Leverman Is Wanted. The Civil Service Commission is to hold an examination to obtain eligibles for appointment as leverman on the army engineer dredge Levecar, working in the Potomac and the Chesapeake. The job pays \$70 a month and subsistence.

Fishery Clerks Promoted. Edgar C. Frazier and Daniel R. Gilmore, clerks in the Bureau of Fisheries, have been promoted to \$1,600 and \$1,200, respectively. The temporary appointments of Frazier and Gilmore, Frederick Fish and G. F. Rommel, of the Bureau of Standards, have been extended.

Whitlock For Belgium. President Wilson has decided to send the name of Brand Whitlock, Mayor of Toledo, as minister to Belgium to succeed Theodor Barth of Baltimore. The Belgian government has already notified the State Department that Mr. Whitlock will be acceptable.

Election Pleases Democrats. Commenting on the Democratic victory during the Virginia campaign, Frank E. Doremus of Michigan, chairman of the Democratic Congressional committee, today said, "The election of Mayor Culler in the First West Virginia district is very gratifying to all friends of the Administration, and a splendid endorsement of the policies of President Wilson and the party."
