Ryan and Leivelt Are Sent to Toledo Team



COACHES ALLOW NAVY ELEVEN TO REST UP

Team Is Too Close to Final Season Form to Have Much Spirited Work.

ANNAPOLIS, Md., Nov. 4.—With the football season just about at its middle point the Naval Academy coaches feel that the team has come so close to its final season form so far as general play goes that they are using the squad so as to perfect certain details and are permitting only short periods of real work against the scrubs, and these at intervals.

The practice period is devoted largely to punting and place kicking, handling the ball and working out the various special formations, but without opposition. Special attention is being given to various plays based on the forward pass, and there is no doubt that the Navy team has acquired more proficiency along this line than has any other Navy team in the past.

The chief reason why the Navy team can be handled in this unusual manner is the fact that nearly all of its members have had large experience not only in playing the game, but with the other members of the team, Brown and Gilchrist are playing their fourth year on the Navy team. Ingram, Ralston, Howe, Redman, Nichols, and Leonard have been members of the team for two seasons. Perry and Harrison won places on the team last year, and Mitchell and Gilchrist were members of the squad during two full seasons, participating in several games.

After all these matters of triumph and defeat come and go in changing dynasties. The St. Louis Browns and the Boston Nationals once ruled baseball. But not today. The Giants for a long time were the most hopeless tailenders of their circuit. Yale was rampant above Harvard for a long time and it so happens that the Crimson is due. And it's hard to check a bloke who is due, if said bloke insists upon going to it.

But in the meanwhile Col. A. A. Stagg, of Chicago University, is piking along with his usual serenity, holding, as it were, the even lyrical tenor of his way. His main stylin' now is Minnesota and when November 15 arrives there should be enough fur displaced to cover a large thick section of the West.
