JEROME TO APPEAL IF THAW IS FREED

CONCORD, N. H., Feb. 13.—The most important of the many Thaw hearings since the flight of Harry K. Thaw, slayer of Stanford White, from Mattawamissett into Canada and his return to the United States is scheduled for tomorrow in the United States district court here.

Judge Edgar A. Aldrich will hear arguments of New York State and Thaw attorneys on Thaw's request for a permanent writ of habeas corpus insuring him against extradition, and on his petition for admission to bail, pending trial on the New York State conspiracy charge.

William Travers Jerome, special assistant attorney general for New York in the Thaw case, will leave for Concord tonight. He declares he will appear if the decision favors Thaw. It was reported here that Attorney General Franklin Carmody, of New York, may be present at the hearing.
