

OLD GUARD ACTIVITY

IS WORRYING G. O. P.

Tendency of Penrose, Foraker, Curtis, and Cannon to 'Come Back' Alarms Some.

Republican leaders, with the exception of the extreme reactionaries, are worrying over the tendency of the Old Guard to 'come back' in several important States.

With Penrose looming up strong in Pennsylvania and likely to win another term in the Senate; with Foraker developing unexpected strength in Ohio in the race for the Republican senatorial nomination; with 'Uncle Joe' Cannon springing for the long-held office of Congressman for the Danville district; and with former Senator Curtis, of Kansas, trying hard to edge Senator 'Joe' Brewster off the sidewalk, it makes those Republicans who are hoping for the rehabilitation and rejuvenation of the party extremely uneasy.

His Nomination Clinched. Penrose has the nomination in Pennsylvania clinched. Nothing can keep him from that. The next question is whether he can be defeated at the polls. The more progressive Republicans here, and many who are not classed as Progressives, would like to see Penrose beaten and Pinchot elected, on the theory that if Penrose is re-elected he will be held up as a reason for the man to frighten strength from the Republican party.

Foraker's entrance into the Ohio race badly disconcerted the plans of Republican leaders in that State. They hoped to sweep the State away from the Democrats, but Foraker is making such progress toward nomination that they don't know whether they can break the Democratic grip or not. If Senator Burton were to run for another term, many of his friends think he could win. That is, they think he could get the nomination, and that the nomination with him would mean the support of the bill for repeal of free tariffs as one of the reasons. The situation in the primaries, however, has become so complicated that friends of Senator Burton are renewing pressure on him to make the race. Senator Burton is not popular with the progressive Republicans of the Senate, but they would prefer to see him nominated and elected to Penrose's chair.

'Uncle Joe' Homesick. As for 'Uncle Joe' Cannon, his ambition seems to be a kind of homesickness to get back to Washington. Ever since he left Congress he has been a sort of fish out of water. It is more than even money here that 'Uncle Joe' if he keeps his vigor to election time, will be returned. Former Senator Curtis is one of the best politicians in the country, and is said to be making headway against Senator Brewster. At any rate, his campaign is being keenly watched from this distance. The nomination and election of these men, from the viewpoint of those Republicans who want to see a 'get-together' policy carried out, would be most unfortunate. The election of Foraker has a bad moral effect politically, and would drive a lot of voters who are now undecided, to the Republican side. Doubt over into the Bull Moose leaders, if they have any sense, they will be in good shape in the campaign which will be growing vigorous a year hence.

THE FISHERMAN'S GUIDE

The bass fishermen are watching the skies with an anxious eye these days, for the opening of the season is but three days away, and the reverse comes a heavy rain to muck up the river there will be a good-sized army of casters getting into action next Saturday, the first day of the season. It will not be a good-sized army, any further up the river than Montgomery county before June 15, nor to be fought with any bass in one's possession in Virginia before that date. The District of Columbia the season will be open and the jurisdiction of the laws in these two communities extends to the high water mark on the Virginia shore.

A great many novice bait casters have an idea that a lure striking the water at the end of fifty or seventy-five feet of line frightens the fish. Such is not the case, and in many cases, the reverse is true, the commotion inciting the quarry to strike. Some of the best advice that solves on the delicacy of the quarry, is to start the retrieve just a moment before the lure hits the water. This is much better than letting the lure slide after hitting the water. After the attention of the fish has been attracted it will sometimes change mind about striking if it gets a good look at a motionless lure.

Sometimes, it is true, the bass will strike at a 'dead' lure, while the fisherman is arguing with a back lash, and a very trying time for him, and fishermen are likely to follow. But this happens only early in the season or in the Northern countries, where the bass are unusually active and 'gamey'. A general rule it is the motion of the lure that incites the fish to strike, and the man who is careless about this feature can never have more than ordinary success.

(2) The water is deep and swift, and the pool bears its name because the fish are known to congregate there. (3) Middle Rock above Chain bridge.

BRYAN GETS SENATE VIEWS UPON TREATY

Confers With Foreign Relations Committee on Proposed Danish Pact.

Secretary of State Bryan was in conference with the Foreign Relations Committee of the Senate for a short time today. He was working on the new Danish arbitration treaty, taking up with the committee the question of making certain exceptions from arbitration of specific matters, such as copyright disputes, international labor disputes, and other things of limited importance from an international standpoint. The committee discussed the question, but did not act.

The Mexican situation was not discussed. The committee reported in favor of acceptance of five limitations to international congresses. They are: The international congress of chambers of commerce at Paris, June 8 to 10. This was later accepted by the Senate. The international congress on occupation of Vienna, in September. The international exposition of fisheries at Boulogne-Sur-Mer, June 15. The international congress on Neurology, at Bern, September.

The international dental congress, at London, August 2. This was accepted by the Senate late in the day. The Sutherland proposal for arbitration of the canal tolls dispute was made a special order for next Wednesday.

AMERICAN CAPTURES TO GET DIPLOMAS FOR DOMESTIC ART

EPSON, England, May 27.—In the presence of the King and Queen and a brilliant throng, Durbar II, owned by H. B. Duryea, an American, and ridden by Jockey MacGee, also an American, this afternoon won the \$22,000 Epson Downs Derby. The winner, which finished three lengths ahead, was the only American entry in the race.

The time-honored race, the most famous turf event in England, was worth \$22,000 to the winner, with £2,000 for second place and £1,000 for third. The race was seen by a wildly enthusiastic crowd.

Sir E. Cassel's Hapsburg was second, and Peter the Hermit was third.
