CARRANZA SEEKS TO PLACATE VILLA

Offers Him All the Coal He Needs for Operating His Railroads in North.

EL PASO, Tex., July 2.—General Carranza has notified Gen. Francisco Villa in that he can have all the coal he needs, from the coal fields of Coahuila, for the operation of his railroads, according to a dispatch received today from Torreon.

This is taken as an indication that Carranza is willing to yield a great deal to prevent an open break with Villa. It is believed that before the conference is well under way, Gen. Pablo Gonzalez and Gen. Alvaro Obregon will also be represented.

Returning from Monterey today, Rafael E. Musquin, constitutionalist, denied that General Carranza is preparing to flee to the United States if Villa and his adherents make a hostile move.
