

CARRANZA ORDERS PEACE PARLEY HERE

Rebel Chief Tells Junta to Confer With Huertista Delegates Now in U. S.

Unofficial advice received here today says General Carranza has decided to authorize the constitutionalist junta here to begin parleys with the Huertista delegates in an effort to settle Mexico's internal affairs.

This acceptance is reported to have been wired direct to Ambassador Da Gama of Brazil, and the latter will confer with his associate mediators in New York today to perfect arrangements to bring the representatives of the warring elements together.

Constitutionalist leaders here profess to believe an arrangement for a provisional government can be reached. They say that Huertista is ready to step down and out.

Waiting for Word. In fact for the last three days they have been looking for word that Pedro Lascurain, or some other non-Huertista sympathizer, had been named as provisional president.

It is believed the mutiny among his troops in the Vera Cruz district has brought home to him for the first time the precariousness of his own condition.

Reports have been circulated here that the last twenty-four hours Carranza has a promise from the United States authorities that he will be granted asylum in Vera Cruz if forced to flee Mexico City.

While Administration officials deny a understanding has been reached that the United States has always offered asylum to political refugees who sought the protection of the flag and say that no exception would be made in Huertista's case.

To Remain in North. That Carranza expects to settle the revolution without being forced to capture Mexico City is indicated by the outcome of the Villa-Carranza mediation parleys.

This, officials here who are following events in Mexico City say, would hardly be the case if any energetic hostile movements were contemplated at the present time.

Gen. Villa Now Agrees To New Peace Compact

TORREON, Coahuila, July 8.—Gen. Venustiano Carranza has been recognized as first chief of the constitutionalist revolution and Gen. Francisco Villa is subordinate to him.

Gen. Villa now agrees to a new peace compact which would settle the internal peace parley here intended to reunite the Villa and Carranza factions.

In settling this point the question of supplying the division of the north, which Villa commands, with coal and ammunition is probably the main automatic solution.

While General Villa owes Carranza absolute subordination, Carranza on the other hand, is obliged to meet the wishes of the Villa troops.

The conference is ended, so far as vital points are concerned.

This statement was made today that the results of the meetings were satisfactory.

General Villa said: "I hope that the outcome of the conference will be beneficial to Mexico and that patriotic motives will cause the compact to be kept."

Second Revolt Expected Near Vera Cruz Today

VERA CRUZ, July 8.—A second revolt in the ranks of the Mexican federalists outside Vera Cruz is expected today, it is believed by the command and by a majority of the federal and constitutionalist forces at Tejeria was anticipated today by General Carranza's aides here.

Although it has developed that only a comparatively small number of men mutinied yesterday, the advance of the constitutionalists along the Atlantic lines to within a short distance of the federal outposts, is taken as an indication that the rebel officers have a full understanding with some of the federal commanders.

The constitutionalists declare that once a general revolt in the federal ranks is in progress, the constitutionalist forces will promptly assume control of the territory outside Vera Cruz.

Then the railroad between this port and the capital will be cut, and General Huertista will be virtually bottled up in Mexico City.

The constitutionalist force which advanced to a point near Tejeria yesterday is estimated at about 1,000 men.

Although the troops were supposed to have been picked by the dictator because they were considered loyal, the constitutionalists declare the men are on the verge of a general outbreak.

This will take the form of a desertion to the rebel ranks, and the guns and ammunition furnished by Huertista will be turned against the forces remaining loyal to him.

Mexico City Expects Peace Soon to Come

MEXICO CITY, July 8.—The Niagara protocols were expected to be submitted to the senate today and rumors were circulated that important developments looking toward the establishment of peace in the republic might be expected.

It is reported that the gap in the Mexican railway outside of Vera Cruz is to be repaired and through trains will be run from the capital to the port.

This is regarded as a favorable indication and the general impression here today is that prospects are improving for an agreement between the dominant factions for the establishment of a provisional government which shall be acceptable to all.


U. S. Ships Quit Mexican Waters; More to Return

Funeral Urns Will Be Set Up in Union Square—No Violence, Unless by Police, Berkman Declares.

NEW YORK, July 8.—Anarchists will pay tribute to their three dead—the victims of a tenement bomb explosion—in Union square Saturday.

Police or no police, rules or no rules, they were determined today that the demonstration over the three urns of ashes should be held as originally planned.

Alexander Berkman, leading anarchist, said laconically today: "The demonstration will come off. There will be no violence unless the police themselves make it."

The health department today relaxed its order that the bodies must be cremated by 10 o'clock, and permitted the "reds" to take their dead to the Fresh Pond (L. I.) Crematory at 1 o'clock.

From that place the ashes of Carson, Hanson, and Berg will be brought tonight to the Anarchist publication, "Mother Earth," offices, there to rest in state until Saturday.

March On Saturday. Saturday morning, led by Alexander Berkman, and other prominent anarchists, a procession of the no-law advocates will march to Union square, set out the urns before the crowd, and listen to speeches by Berkman, Laurence D. Abbott, Elizabeth Gurley Flynn, Carlo Tresca, and others.

Anarchy's red flag will be unfurled by the throng, Berkman declared, but there would be no violence unless the police start trouble, he emphatically asserted.

Vigorous protest against the Health Board's peremptory order for today's disposition of the bodies will be made at the meeting, Berkman said.

Will Ignore Police. "We could force a legal issue on the ground that the bodies were not completely identified, and the laws say a body can be held six months in such a case," Berkman declared angrily today, "but as we do not believe in laws we will only make public protest in Union square. The police may claim a victory by forcing this cremation today—but the funeral arrangements committee will proceed tonight with original plans."

Berkman added that his followers will ask no favors of the police, believing there is no law or rule of the "law enforcing group" that demands a permit for such a funeral procession and demonstration as they plan.

For Ports of Entry. Duluth, Minn., and Superior Wis., will be created ports of entry in the district of Duluth and Superior of which the headquarters will be in Duluth, if a bill introduced this afternoon by Senator La Follette should be passed.

Receipt of reports from foreign countries of the large number of letters from this country bearing insufficient postage has induced Secretary Redfield to request the co-operation of the Post-office Department in bringing the matter to the attention of American business men.

Secretary Redfield has suggested a circular indicating the foreign countries which require 5-cent postage be posted on postoffice bulletin boards throughout the country, a plan which Postmaster General Burdick is preparing to follow out.

Commerce Department Announces Changes

The Department of Commerce today announced the following changes in its personnel:

Bureau of the Census: temporary appointments of Henry Saunders, Clarence E. Fogle, Robert Williams, and Benjamin W. Sharp as laborers at \$7.20 each, extended, and Pauline E. Barfield, clerk, promoted to \$1,200.

Bids for Dreadnoughts Will Soon Be Asked

Secretary of the Navy Daniels has announced that about August 1 the department will advertise for bids for the construction of three new battleships, which will include the one to be available when Greece completes the purchase of the Mississippi and Idaho.

One of the new dreadnoughts will be built at the New York navy yard. The plans of the three vessels will be similar to those of No. 20, which was built in New York. Until names are chosen for the new ships they will be known as Nos. 40, 41, and 42.

Ohio Health Officers Declare War on Rats

Two thousand health officials in Ohio have been asked to declare war on rats, the United States Public Health Service was advised today, in a letter from Secretary McCampbell, of the Ohio State board of health.

The government officers were informed that that number of communities had been informed of the bubonic plague situation in New Orleans, were cautioned to be on the alert, and to begin to exterminate the rat.

May Bridge Sabine River.

Under the terms of a bill passed by the Senate this afternoon the Frost-Johnson Lumber Company at Shreveport, La., was authorized to build a temporary bridge across the Sabine river on the Texas-Louisiana border, about two miles west of Humber, La.

OBREGON DEFEATS FEDERAL COLUMN

Sortie From Guadalajara Brings 36-Hour Battle—Casualties Are Heavy.

ORENDAY, Jalisco, Mexico, July 8.—After thirty-six hours of savage fighting, the constitutionalist forces of Gen. Alvaro Obregon have utterly routed a strong federal column, which attempted a sortie from Guadalajara Sunday night.

The federals made their sortie under cover of darkness, but the constitutionalist advance guard, near this town, twenty-five miles northwest of Guadalajara, was prepared.

The battle raged for a day and a half without cessation. The federals in their flight, abandoned ten troop trains and much field artillery which had been brought into hundreds of small arms, quantities of provisions and several hundred prisoners, were captured.

The Leader, preparatory to installing their own lines of men's wear, will offer the entire Eiseman stock at a sacrifice in order to effect an immediate clearance.

Jury Fails to Agree In Lewis Murder Case

The jury in the case of Irene Lewis, colored, charged with manslaughter in connection with the death of Ethel Jefferson, colored, reported a disagreement to Justice Anderson in Criminal Court No. 1 today, and was discharged.

Originally the Lewis woman pleaded guilty to the charge, admitting that she struck the Jefferson girl with a bottle. Later she claimed that she used the bottle in self-defense, and Justice Gould advised her to plead not guilty, so the plea was changed.

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T. R. "PALLONARO," SAYS BRITISH CRITIC

"Toy Gas Balloon Filler," Assests Landor, Is Roman Name for the Colonel.

PARIS, July 8.—Returning today from Rome, Henry Savage Landor again branded Colonel Roosevelt as a "faker" for his report of discovery of the "river of doubt" in Brazil.

"Roosevelt's London address," he said, "does not change the situation. Members of the Geographical Society, before whom he spoke, consider him a fake as an explorer. First, he claimed discovery of a river—and then he admitted having crossed that river on a bridge spanned by telegraph wires—next, he went on to say that whoever doubted him might go and be received by friends at the spot where he discovered the river."

"Rome has the right name for Roosevelt—'pallonaro'—meaning literally 'one who inflates toy balloons with gas.' The Pope refused to give and presented me with a gold medal and an autographed photograph, mentioning my work in Brazil, and closed the audience by giving me his apostolic benediction. The fact that I was with the Pope for forty-five minutes startled Rome. You will recall the Pope refused to see Colonel Roosevelt."
