

152 BARROOMS MUST CLOSE BY NOVEMBER

License Fee in District Will Jump to \$1,500 for Retail Establishments.

Before November 1, 152 barrooms will be required to close their doors. The excise law provides that the Excise Board shall reduce the number of licenses for barrooms, including those in hotels and clubs, to 300 by November 1.

WAIT CONGRESS' O. K. ON FOOTBALL PLANS

Permission to Use Polo Field Only Barrier to Playing Army-Navy Game Here.

Congressional permission for the use of the polo field in Potomac Park on which it is proposed to stage the next annual Army-Navy football game is the only barrier to the plans to have the great struggle played in this city.

The 4,500 seats will be chairs. Spacious entrances to all parts of the stadium are provided in the plans. Nearly 1,000 boxes also are provided. The stadium will seat just 12,500 more persons than Franklin Field, where the annual struggle has been staged during recent years.

Another slight hitch in the plans to have the game played here involves the posting of a guarantee of \$12,000 by Washington's civic organizations to cover the expenses of the athletic associations. Granville M. Hunt, chairman of the conventions committee of the Chamber of Commerce, is doing everything in his power to make the members of the chamber and of other organizations realize the importance of posting this guaranty and anticipates that this phase of the situation will adjust itself as soon as Congress gives permission for the use of the park.

No Word on 'Ley de Fuga'

The War and Navy Departments today were without advice concerning the investigation of Ensign William Richardson, charged by Correspondent Boalt with applying ley de fuga, or law of flight, to Mexicans at the occupation of Vera Cruz. Acting Secretary Roosevelt said he did not know whether the investigation had been completed.

Mrs. Champ Clark, wife of the Speaker of the House, who is a recognized authority on Virginia history, and especially all that relates to Thomas Jefferson, has pointed to blunders the solons of the Virginia legislature, who made a curious mistake in a recent resolution passed by that body.

In this resolution the legislature memorialized the National Congress to aid Mrs. Martin W. Littleton in her project of putting Monticello in the hands of the people, and names "Gov. William Carey Nicholas" as one of the folk buried at Monticello.


