

District Soldiers On Holiday Today

Camp Is Deserted and 1,800 Militiamen Are Scattered Between Norfolk and Virginia Beach—Dress Parade This Afternoon at 5:30 o'Clock Due to Draw Thousands.

DISTRICT NATIONAL GUARD HEADQUARTERS, VIRGINIA BEACH, Va., Aug. 2.—Washington's citizen soldiers are taking a holiday today. From Norfolk to Virginia Beach, a distance of thirty-nine miles by rail, the 1,800 militiamen are scattered. They are getting what may be the only real day of rest to be granted them during this year's maneuvers. For tomorrow the real object of their coming this far from home will be attacked, and for the next six days they are going to find a lot of work staring them in the face.

The camp is practically deserted today. Except for the details of militiamen designated for guard duty, and a few others who prefer entertaining their visitors on the camping ground, there are but few khaki-clad guardsmen to be found.

THRONGS DUE AT PARADE.

They are coming back late this afternoon, however, for at 5:30 o'clock, the big event of the week—the dress parade of the First and Second Infantries combined—will be given, and half of Norfolk and the adjoining country is expected here to witness it. The railroads will run special trains into camp from Norfolk and Virginia Beach, and practically every rail boat available in Norfolk has been chartered for the trip to Virginia Beach. Preparations for handling thousands of visitors is being made.

The guardsmen are accustomed to their new surroundings by this time, and after they get through the details of today, they will find themselves ready for a real week's work.

All of the instructors detailed by the War Department have reached camp, and everything is ready for them to take up their duties. Henceforth, a certain number of hours will be spent each day in the open space surrounding the camp in working out the problems given by the army instructor.

It has not been decided when the real maneuvering will begin. A carload of ammunition to be used in the mimic warfare, which went astray, has reached camp, and has been carefully stored away, awaiting orders. These blank cartridges are to be issued to the men some time this week, and during the sham battles they will be permitted to pump paper wads in the direction of each other as long as these last.

First Infantry Reviewed. The first formation of any consequence of the present encampment was that of last night, when the First Infantry, commanded by Col. Charles H. Orund, paraded over the broad space to the rear of the camping ground and reviewed by Brigadier General Harries and staff and several hundred visitors. The First Infantry band furnished the music for the parade. The nightly concerts by the bands of the First and Second Infantries, given on the plaza facing brigade headquarters, are proving popular, and at last

beach has been turned over to the militiamen. From 8:40 till 11 o'clock each night, the ballroom is given to the guardsmen, free of any charge. Special trains to get them back into camp also have been placed into service.

Capt. Thomas R. Clark, the man who will issue the pay checks to the officers and the "long green" to the men for their service during the maneuvers, is in camp, having reached here last night. Captain Clark soon is to become a Major. His promotion may come before the end of the camp.

A complete telephone system has been established in camp by the signal corps, each division being connected with all others through a central office. Direct connection with Norfolk and Virginia Beach also can be had.

Col. William E. Harvey's Second Infantry will go on parade tomorrow afternoon at 5:30 o'clock.

One of the few times during an annual encampment when the two bands of the militia are consolidated will occur each night in giving the concerts. The First Regiment band opened the series last night.

A telegram of good wishes was sent to Capt. E. Michael Drew, now adjutant of the Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers and Sailors, at Fort Leavenworth, by his old friends in the guard today. Captain Drew for five years was connected with brigade headquarters in a clerical capacity. He received his promotion and re-assignment a few weeks ago.

Major George L. Tait, of the Third Battalion, First Infantry, is back in camp this year with what probably is the best appearance. The company has had during his long term of service as a militiaman. The battalion has its complete war strength.

Company E, Second Infantry, has a record never before made by a District organization. The company was organized in a week, and brought with it to camp fifty-six officers and men, or but one man short of a complete company. Special permission was given by the War Department to the officers to take recruits during the week preceding the departure for camp, and the organization was perfected the night before leaving for Virginia Beach.

A little excitement was occasioned in the Second Infantry section last night by the burning of a cook tent. Sparks from the stove set fire to the canvas, and the tent was well ablaze before it was discovered. Most of the equipment was rescued. Capt. Clarence Walker, commanding I company, the owner of

the tent, directed the work of fighting the flames.

Capt. W. B. Hudson, of the hospital corps, who is superintendent of the bathing beach in Washington, figured in a sensational attempt to save a drowning man at the beach yesterday. The man was too far gone for medical assistance when Dr. Hudson arrived and tried to resuscitate him.

The entire brigade was mustered in this morning, so each man might sign the necessary roll to get his pay check from Uncle Sam. Capt. T. R. Clark, of the pay department, was on the job early with the necessary rolls.

Maj. J. Fred Cook, adjutant general, reached camp this morning and assumed his duties.

The Second Infantry marched to Virginia Beach yesterday afternoon to go in bathing, and the band was ordered to accompany it and play while the men bathed. The band failed to reach the beach before the men were all out of the water, and on return to camp, Colonel Harvey, the commanding officer, ordered that the bandmen give a half hour concert in the company's street as punishment.

Warburg's Nomination Likely To Be Confirmed

Hearing of Paul M. Warburg, of New York, nominee for the Federal Reserve Board, will be resumed at 10 o'clock tomorrow before the Senate Banking and Currency Committee, behind locked doors.

Mr. Warburg's confirmation is now looked on as probable, in view of the need for prompt organization of the Board.

Mr. Warburg was grilled by members of the committee for about four hours on Saturday.

Senate Amends Trade Commission Measure

Limited court review is provided for in the trade commission bill pending before the Senate, as amended by the Cummins substitute.

The Cummins plan proceeds along the lines of the existing interstate commerce law. An amendment by Senator Clapp, providing that aggrieved persons should be allowed to obtain three-fold damages for injuries resulting from unfair competition, was under discussion when the Senate recessed until tomorrow.
