CARE FOR REFUGEES, IS KAISER'S COMMAND

BERLIN, Aug. 28.—(Via Rome.) Emperor Wilhelm has telegraphed to the cabinet from the front, directing that immediate steps be taken for the relief of the Prussian refugees who have been driven from their homes by the Russian invasion. The Kaiser directs that they be cared for inside the German lines of defense until the Russian invasion is checked, and it is possible for them to return to their homes. It is stated that energetic steps are being taken to meet the Russian invasion. Additional reinforcements from the reserve divisions are being rushed to the front. It is believed that the Germans will engage the Russians in a general battle as soon as the Czar's armies come into contact with the first line of forts.
