President Rogers Plans Improvements in District League

ROGERS HAS IDEAS TO BOOST LEAGUE

Calls Meeting of District Circuit to Propose Plans for Betterment.

Y. M. C. A. DEFEATED TWICE

Harvey T. Rogers, president of the District Circuit League, has formulated many ideas for the betterment of the circuit of which he is the head and has called a session of the body for tomorrow night at the Royal Altes when several changes for the betterment of the wheel which he wishes to present to the governing board and he has chosen this time to present his ideas for the approval of the various team captains and officers of the league.

In announcing the meeting for tomorrow, President Rogers stated that many conditions had changed since the present by-laws and constitution had been adopted and that he merely wishes to prepare the league to meet with these changes as they come up.

I believe the District League, as far as organization is concerned, stands on a firm foundation, as any duplicate body of the city and it is my desire to keep it so, and for that reason I believe a thorough consideration of the present rules and understanding as to the construction of their meaning is important at this time," said Rogers in announcing tomorrow's session.

Lichtenhein Owns All.

MONTREAL, Nov. 20.—When the franchise of the Montreal baseball club of the International League was offered for sale yesterday to dissolve a

partnership between S. E. Lichtenhein, Gordon, C. Cushman and E. B. Carrington there were only two bids. Frank McKenna, on behalf of a syndicate, offered \$20,000 as his bid, while S. E. Lichtenhein, who held the controlling interest in the club, offered \$30,000. As this was the highest bid within the stated time the club was knocked down to Lichtenhein, who now owns it outright. For some time there have been two factions in the club, each placing a price on its share of the stock, and to dissolve the partnership the sale was agreed on.
