PUTS STATE TAX ON ORGANIZED BASEBALL

ALBANY, Jan. 27.—Five per cent of the gross receipts at baseball games between teams in "organized baseball" would be paid into the State treasury as a State tax, under a bill introduced by Assemblyman Herman Kramer of Brooklyn.

The State athletic commission is given power to enforce the law, a penalty of \$50 a day for each violation being provided in the bill.

Under the Kramer bill every "corporation, association, or league which holds baseball games in the State under the system or arrangement known as "organized baseball," must furnish the State athletic commission with a report every Monday morning showing the number of tickets sold for all games during the week, and the amount of money taken in at these games.

Within ten days after the filing of such a report, the tax must be paid to the State controller.

Law Stops Sale Of Beanshooters

New York Aldermen Don't Object, Though, to Putty Blowing in Schools.

NEW YORK, Jan. 27.—The board of aldermen has adopted a resolution forbidding the sale of beanshooters and putty blowers and their use in the streets of New York. But, hoary!—they forgot all about the schools, and every regular boy knows it's more fun to hit the teacher than even a fat man with a silk tie.

Alderman Harry Holtzke, of the Bronx, who introduced the resolution, was asked if there was any lingering animosity from his school days to account for this omission, but his answer was one of those "refined" ones of which Frank P. Walsh, chairman of the Commission on Industrial Relations, accused John D. Rockefeller, jr., and left the questioner in considerable doubt as to whether any resolution at all had been passed.

But the record showed it had passed, and that a violation of the law means a fine of \$10 or two days in jail.

WARNED NOT TO KILL MIGRATORY BIRDS

Sportsmen Informed That Spring Shooting of This Game Is Against Law.

Warning to sportsmen that spring shooting of migratory birds is absolutely prohibited, was issued today by the Department of Agriculture. From the number of letters which they have received on the subject recently, department officials believe that sportsmen may unintentionally violate the provisions of the Federal migratory bird law.

To prevent this the warning issued today contains the following explanation of the law: "No water fowl can be shot in the Northern or breeding zone after January 15, except in New Jersey, where the season extends to February 1. In most of the Southern, or wintering, zone the season closes February 1, but extends to February 15 in Florida, Georgia, and South Carolina.

These regulations were proclaimed on October 1, 1914. No change has since been made in them and no change is likely to be made until the constitutionality of the law has been passed on by the United States Supreme Court. As a matter of fact, the law provides that all changes in regulations must be considered for a period of ninety days, and then must be approved and signed by the President before they become effective. It is thus evident that there is no possibility that the prohibition of spring shooting will be in any way modified this year.
