JIM COFFEY KNOCKS OUT REICH IN THIRD

Jabs Followed By Swings, and Irish Giant Finally Lands Victim in Stomach.

NEW YORK, May 6.—Rich Irish brogues predominated in the cheers of 10,000 persons that greeted a new hero in Jim Coffey, of Roscommon, who pounded Al Reich into submission in less than three rounds of fighting in Madison Square Garden last night.

HOLY NAME TEAMS MAY FORM LEAGUE

Summer Camp and Baseball Circuit Are Embodied in Plans of Society.

A baseball league and a camp for boys are planned by the Washington branch of the Holy Name Society. Plans for the league and the camp were made at a meeting of the junior committee last night at the home of Frank Wismer, 1312 Thirty-first street northwest.

The committee is composed of Frank Wismer, Capt. Harry Walsh, N. J. McGee, John Kane, Frank P. Nunning, and Schaeffer, president of the Diocesan Union, and President John Hadley Doyle, of the Washington branch, also attended.

Capt. Eugene C. Edwards, who was president of the Marquette League, was selected to head the new baseball organization, and George E. Long was made official umpire.

The games will be played on the old Olympic grounds in Georgetown, at Thirty-fifth street and Wisconsin avenue.

It is probable that St. Joseph and also St. Mary's of Alexandria will come in. All players must be members of the Holy Name Society, and the age limit has been fixed at nineteen, with the provision that boys of sixteen and seventeen may be accepted if approved by the board of managers of the various teams.
