

BIG BARRAGE FOR ALEXANDRIA

Reservoir, When Filled, Will Contain Year's Supply of Water.

ALEXANDRIA, June 1.—The Barrage dam of the Alexandria Water Company, which was begun in the spring of 1913, is practically completed.

On account of the necessity of permitting the usual flow of Holmes Run to pass down the valley to supply the runs below, only the surplus water in heavy rain falls can be used for storage purposes, hence it may require a long time to fill the reservoir.

The dam, reservoir and land are said to represent an expenditure of \$50,000. David J. Howell & Son, this city, with offices in Washington, are the engineers in charge.
