

YOUNG WOMEN WIN COLLEGIATE HONORS

Two Hundred and Eleven Graduates of G. W. U. to Receive Degrees Tonight.

Young women captured some of the coveted prizes for excellence in several branches of study, and will share the highest collegiate honors with the men students when degrees are awarded tonight at Continental Memorial Hall to the graduating class of George Washington University.

Two hundred and eleven graduates from nine departments of the university are to receive degrees from Rear Admiral Charles H. Stockton, president of the university.

Close rivalry of the feminine contingent will result in the bestowal of degrees upon the largest number of women ever graduated by the university.

Notable among the winners of highest marks were: Joanna Elizabeth Best, mathematics; Dorothy Mearns, Greek; Elizabeth Foster, history; Mabel Keenan, rhetoric; Flora Hull, sociology; and Letitia Park Southgate, Latin.

Graduates wearing academic caps and gowns will march into Continental Hall promptly at 8 o'clock. All members of the faculty and board of trustees will occupy an adjacent room.

Pharmacy—John A. Milburn memorial scholarship for best record in senior class, Morris G. Goldstein.

Scholarship in English—John A. Milburn memorial scholarship for best record in English, Eugene B. Witherby.

"PAY \$50,000 TEN DAYS AFTER DEATH"

Holder Seeks Payment On Note Given For Saving Life of Friend.

NEW YORK, June 9.—One of the strangest notes ever brought to the attention of a New York court—a note calling for payment ten days after the death of the signer—is the basis of an action filed yesterday by Hazyoun Hohnness Topakyan, formerly Persian consul general to New York, to obtain \$50,000 from the estate of George Clinton Batcheller, who lived at 27 West Seventy-second street, and was head of the firm of G. Batcheller & Co., 130 Fifth avenue.

The note read: New York, November 2, 1914. Ten days after my death I promise to pay to the order of my friend H. H. Topakyan, who saved my life, \$50,000, at my bank, or 130 Fifth avenue. Value received. GEORGE CLINTON BATCHELLER.

Woman Saves Life of Man Beaten by Thugs

ST. LOUIS, June 9.—Mrs. Frank Reese, of East St. Louis, saved the life of Oscar Bilger, forty-five, by stitching his wounds with her hands until medical aid arrived when he was attacked by three negroes on the outskirts of Cahokia, Ill., and his throat cut. The negroes later were arrested.

CITY CUPIDS OUSTED, SET UP A NEW STAND

New York's "Marriage Chapel" Moves Across From Municipal Building.

NEW YORK, June 9.—The Tammany (tamvrate) in charge of the "city's marriage chapel," whose sources of prosperity have been under the scrutiny of Commissioner of Accounts Wallstein, have been expelled from the bureau in the municipal building by City Clerk Scully.

They straightway hired a room of their own at 42 Duane street, a stone's throw from the municipal building, and resumed the marrying business there today. They took with them Alderman Happy Jack Reardon, who has read a civil marriage service as many as thirty times a day in the "chapel" for many years, and who says he never took a cent for it. Incidentally the official bureau on the third floor of the municipal building is to be continued under the supervision of two clerks assigned by Mr. Scully.
