

# SUBMARINE OF KAISER SUNK BY THE BRITISH

### Balfour Announces Capture of Six Officers and Crew of Twenty-one Men.

### NINTH UNDERSEA VICTIM

#### Eight Lost in Sinking of Steamer Gertrude in Collision Off Arklow Lightship.

LONDON, June 9.—A German submarine has been sunk by the British, and six officers and twenty-one of her crew were made prisoners.

First Lord of the Admiralty Balfour made this announcement in the house of commons this afternoon.

### Germans Take Stanislaw; Utter Collapse of Slavs In Galicia Is Claimed

BERLIN (via wireless to London), June 9.—Stanislaw, the most important railway center in Southeast Galicia, has been stormed and captured by the right wing of the Austro-Germans closing in upon Lemberg.

### French Gain 100 Yards In New Offense Against Village of St. Mihiel

PARIS, June 9.—French troops have swept forward 100 yards along a 200-yard front in the new offensive against the German wedge resting on St. Mihiel.

### Allied Fleet Resumes Attack Upon Asiatic Forts of Dardanelles

ATHENS, June 9.—The Anglo-French fleet has opened heavy fire on the Turkish forts on the Asiatic side of the Dardanelles.

### Ballin Denies Saying Germany Is Defeated

BERLIN (via wireless to Sayville), June 9.—Albert Ballin, director of the Hamburg-American line and at the head of Germany's transportation system since the beginning of the war, today authorized a denial of the statement credited to him by the Paris Matin that Germany already has lost the war.

### Throws Child to Street And Then Jumps Himself

PHILADELPHIA, June 9.—Crazed by religion, Michael McAvony, forty-three, threw his seven-year-old son from a second-story window and then jumped himself.

### Italian Dirigible Falls Into Sea After Raid

ROME, June 9.—Returning from a successful bombardment of the Hungarian seaport of Fiume, the Italian dirigible Citta di Ferrara fell into the sea off Dalmatia. Her crew of two officers and six men were rescued by an enemy patrol ship and made prisoners.

An official statement given out at Vienna says the Citta di Ferrara was pursued by Austrian aviators after the attack on Fiume and destroyed by the Austrian naval aeroplane L-58, the crew being made prisoners.

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
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with a grain of common sense could take it for an examination paper," he said.

That a bright third classman had prepared helps for recent graduates of the Academy in their examinations in modern languages was indicated by the testimony given this morning by Commander F. A. Traut, head of that department. This is the third time Commander Traut has been on the stand. The midshipman was A. C. Rogers, who leads the present second class, he said. Commander Traut stated that the copy of questions and answers of part of the first class examination was in Rogers' handwriting, the paper being found just outside the building after the completion of the examination. He stated that copies of parts of these in the handwriting of Midshipman Stubbs, since a graduate, was actually found in the room where the examination took place, and that this indicated to him that Stubbs had actually taken them in the room.

In answer to a question of Mr. Hay, Commander Traut stated that no proceedings had been taken against Stubbs and other midshipmen of the class, and that they had been allowed to graduate.

Commander Traut mentioned Ensign W. J. Confer, of the graduating class, and Midshipmen F. R. Marston, D. V. Price, and R. J. Walker, of the second class, as having been mentioned in the proceedings, was asked by Admiral Fullam to be put in evidence. ### List of Witnesses.

Just before the taking of the mid-day recess, counsel for the midshipmen submitted a list of witnesses which they desired to summon.

# GIRL SCOUT COUNCIL TO MEET IN CAPITAL

### Delegates from seven States Will Gather at the Raleigh Hotel Tomorrow Morning for the First Annual Meeting of the National Girl Scout Council, which will hold daily sessions until Saturday.

Mrs. Richard Wainwright, national Girl Scout commissioner, will deliver the address of welcome. Other speakers will be Col. Colin Livingstone, president of the National Council of the Boy Scouts of America; Assistant Secretary of Agriculture Carl Vrooman, and Mrs. Archibald Hopkins. The afternoon session will be given over to the reading of reports from the national secretary and visiting delegates.

Friday there will be a discussion of the constitution and various committees will be appointed. Mrs. Juliette Gordon Low, president of the national organization, will preside.

# Destroyer of Zeppelin Given Victoria Cross

LONDON, June 8.—Reginald A. J. Warneford, the young Canadian sublieutenant in the royal navy, who in an aeroplane destroyed a Zeppelin over Belgium, has been given the Victoria Cross.

Warneford's exploit marks the first time a Zeppelin has been brought to earth by a monoplane. The Canadian aviator sighted the German airship over Belgium, and at once mounted to attack it. By a brilliant flight he secured a position above it and dropped incendiary bombs. The Zeppelin crashed to the ground and burned. The members of her crew, twenty-eight men, were killed.

King George has sent the following telegram to Lieutenant Warneford: "I most heartily congratulate you upon your splendid achievement yesterday, in which you, single-handed, destroyed an enemy airship. I have much pleasure in conferring upon you the Victoria Cross for this gallant act."
