

# MACHINISTS WILL WAIT FOR PRESIDENT

## Will Not Press Navy Yard Wage Demands Until After Conference.

If President Wilson wishes to talk over the situation at the Washington Navy Yard with representatives of the machinists there, a delegation will go to Cornhill. If he wishes to delay the conference, the leaders of the navy yard workers will not press the matter until he gets back. This announcement was made today by N. P. Alfias, president of the organization comprising all machinists in Government employ.

In deference to the wish of President Wilson for a conference about the matter, the meeting tonight also was called off, and unless a demand is made by the workers, there will be no meeting until after the President has gone over the points at issue with the committee which he named to represent the men. On this committee, beside Mr. Alfias, are Stuart G. McAllister, J. T. Donnelly, A. De Groot, and Bernard Dadd.

Another reason for the continued delay of men who had signed up with the Remington Arms Company is the fact that the strike might become general throughout the Remington plants kept the men from going last week. But even when the system at Bridgeport had been settled, the men hesitated, because of the report that they were to be compelled to work under the Taylor system at Edgystone. Definite assurance was made through the representatives of the Edgystone plant here today that the system is not to be introduced there, and the promise also was given that there are to be no special premium awards. In view of these promises, the position of the men who are awaiting the action of the President to decide whether they will leave the yard, has been strengthened.

Nearly 300 men, it is asserted, would leave directly for Edgystone if the decision of the President sustains the wages cut ordered by Secretary Daniels.

# PRINTERS TO LEAVE FOR WEST THURSDAY

## Delegates to I. T. U. Convention at Los Angeles Will Be Entertained En Route.

Delegates from Columbia Typographical Union, No. 101, accompanied by many individual members, will leave Thursday for Los Angeles, to take part in the convention of the International Typographical Union beginning August 9.

Washington's delegates are Charles P. Johnson, chairman; F. C. Roberts, T. C. Parsons, and J. W. Sherman. Mr. Parsons, who is chairman of the laws committee in the convention, may leave Washington tomorrow. The other delegates and members will travel in a special car to St. Louis, where they will board the "Missouri special," one of three special trains which will carry none but printers.

Leaving St. Louis July 30, the train bearing this city's delegation will stop at the following cities where entertainments have been arranged by local committees: Kansas City and St. Joseph, Mo.; Denver, Colorado Springs, and Pueblo, Colo.; San Francisco, Sacramento and San Francisco. Here arrangements have been made for "Printers' Day" at the exposition August 8.

The printers then will proceed to Los Angeles, arriving there August 8. The convention will be in session from August 9 to 16.

At its conclusion the delegates will be the guests of the Los Angeles Union at the San Diego Exposition. Including the side trips which will be made the Washington representatives will have covered at their return more than 7,000 miles.

The Congressional Union will engineer the onslaught in favor of the Susan B. Anthony amendment, and the prediction of Miss Alice Paul, the chairman, that a suffrage cyclone will hit Washington when Congress convenes in December, already is gathering momentum through the efforts of special political weather makers in the suffrage States.

# BEARD AND BRAIDS TO BE FALL STYLE

## At Least, That's What's Expected If No-Tip Barbers Put in 40-Cent Haircut.

Watch out for this sign: "No tips." (So far so good, but read on.) "Haircut, 40 cents; shave, 25 cents." That started in Philadelphia, and no man knoweth how soon it may await the Capital in its whiskered spots.

Nor is that all. There are to be no more barber shop courtesies, little things like a hot towel, or bay rum, or cologne for your eyebrows, or cocoa butter on your face. If you wish these tonorial desserts you pay for them.

Such is the decision of the Master and Journeymen Barbers' Association, meeting in Philadelphia, which is a Quaker City organization, but whose members are scattered over other cities.

These barbers have sized up their patrons. There are some "cheap skates," it was averred at the gathering, "who don't get their hair cut once every two weeks, but they are other fellows who shave themselves and then go to the barber shops to have their hair cut."

One delegate advocated that the back of the necks of such "cheap guys" be left unshaved when they did make their occasional barber shop visits for hair cuts.

Washington barbers are watchfully waiting. For the year the "no tip" rule has been less frequent, and to offset this barbers have added "extras" to the tonorial menu until most of them have a bill of fare that looks like a soda fountain card or quick lunch room "flimsy."

In a few hotels a 35-cent hair cut and a 25-cent shave already are administered to patrons. None of the regulation shops have tried that yet. But they are anxiously waiting to see whether enough barbers in Philadelphia carry out their threats at their recent meeting to see whether a 40-cent clerk will stand for a 40-cent hair cut.

# Drag Channel for Body Of Frank Keppel

Police of the Harbor precinct are today dragging the Washington channel near the Army War College in an effort to recover the body of Frank Keppel, forty-five, who fell from a launch early yesterday evening and was drowned.

Keppel, whose home was at 142 Heckman street southeast, and who was employed by the Texas Oil Company, went down the river on Saturday night with a party in the launch Greenleaf. They came back up the river late yesterday and when near Washington picked up a disabled motor boat and were bringing it back in tow.

Going to the rear of the launch to fix a stern light, Keppel lost his balance, drowning before aid could reach him. He leaves a wife and five children.

# FOURTEENTH STREET LINE IS IN OPERATION

## New Link Enables Hundreds of Workers to Save Four Blocks to Travel.

The new railway line in Fourteenth street, from F to Water streets, began operation today. Direct service is provided by this line from all parts of the District to the Bureau of Engraving and the offices of the Government auditors.

Observations of traffic conditions will be made by inspectors of the Public Utilities Commission, and if it is found that the service is not being given to the satisfaction of the Washington Railway and Electric Company, it was stated, will be ordered to put on more cars.

The improvement was ordered by the commission following the receipt of many requests for better transportation from employees of Government buildings south of the Mall. The line is of special service to employes and others living west of the Capitol.

Instead of being compelled to go four blocks out of their way to the transfer station at Eleventh and F streets, passengers will transfer at Fourteenth and F.

The E street line from Eleventh and G to Fourteenth and E will be used during the rush hours, from 7 to 9 a. m., and from 4 to 6 p. m.

Certain cars from North Capitol and W street, instead of going to Fifteenth and G, now turn south at Fourteenth street and go to Water street.
