

JOHN D., JR., HOLDS HIS OPEN SHOP IDEA

Unchanged by Visit to Colorado Mines, He Says on His Return.

NEW YORK, Oct. 12.—John D. Rockefeller, Jr., made it clear when, honored from life in Colorado, he alighted from the 8:40 train yesterday at the Pennsylvania station that his views on the open shop had not changed.

Mr. Rockefeller said he was feeling fine and that his trip in the West had done him good. He asked, "What's new?" and when told of the story printed in the morning newspapers regarding the experiment that he was to make with the mines of the Colorado Fuel and Iron Company he answered with a smile:

"Well, I never heard of that. If my father has done anything like that he hasn't told me."

Calls It Personal Matter.

He was asked if his father had given him any part of his holding of Colorado Fuel and Iron Company. He replied as he was walking toward a taxicab:

"That's a personal question, isn't it? It's a family matter, don't you think? You know I don't get any salary. From time to time my father gives me securities. What they are I think is a family matter, something between my father and me."

"Is the situation regarding your holdings in the Colorado Fuel and Iron Company the same as at the time of the inquiry of the Industrial Relations Commission?" he was asked.

"What situation?" he asked.

"The control of the mines. Are you in a position to conduct an industrial experiment with the mines of the Colorado Fuel and Iron Company?"

"I haven't control of the mines," he replied. "My father hasn't given it to me, because he never had it. We only have an interest in it. My father and I have been together in our work for the company. I have always been the representative out there."

Ideas Have Not Changed.

"No; my views are the same as ever," Mr. Rockefeller replied.

"How did you enjoy mining?"

"I spent a month there. With me all the time were sight reporters and everything I did was open. I learned interesting things of great value. I cannot tell you all I learned; it would take too long."

"Asked how he liked conditions in the mines, he said: 'Same as I expected.'"

"Reasonable."

"I have been well informed always as to conditions," he answered. "Ask the newspaper men with me what they thought of conditions. They saw everything and they hold no brief for anybody. They thought conditions were mighty good, and so I did. There was good feeling everywhere."

Mr. Rockefeller said that Mother Jones never had made any suggestions to him, but simply had told him of conditions. Asked if there would be any industrial experiment in the mines, he said:

"My father and I have always worked together for the benefit of both company and employe."

As Mr. Rockefeller was walking across the concourse of the station a woman rushed up to him and seizing him by the arm said: "Oh, Mr. Rockefeller, I want to thank you for the great work that you are doing."

Mr. Rockefeller entered a taxicab and went to the Grand Central Station, where he boarded a train for Pocomoke Hills to join his father.


Admiral Benson Is Guest.


