

### GREATER LIBRARY URGED ON MASONS

#### "Peace at Any Price" Condemned — Knights Commander Will Be Elected.

Reading of reports from the librarian, treasurer general, and secretary general and disapproval of their contents claimed the attention of the Supreme Council, Scottish Rite Masons, in the new temple, Sixteenth and S streets today.

#### Points Out Library's Growth.

In his allocution, Sovereign Grand Commander George Moore, referred to the library, said: "It has already grown to be one of those things of which we may be proud, and we cannot, I think, fix definite limits to its usefulness, not only to the city of Washington, but to the entire country."

The library is already rated as one of the finest in the world, both in number of volumes and the rareness of the books. The librarian today reported that thousands of books, many of which were of great value, were purchased because of their rarity and age. Like the grand commander, the librarian urged that every effort be made to build up the library.

The treasurer general reported the finances of the order in excellent condition. His report dealt with the expenditures for the construction of the house of the temple, which cost more than \$1,000,000. In making this expenditure, his report showed the treasury to be well supplied with funds.

Communications and reports from many subordinate bodies were dealt with in the secretary-general's report, and the committee on obituaries then read its report on the lives of the deceased members of the supreme council.

Although the supreme council follows no definite set pattern, no one knows what business will be taken up next, it was said the election of the knights commander, the highest office of honor and the thirty-third degree honoraries would be considered either late this afternoon or tomorrow morning.

The thirty-third degree honoraries would be considered either late this afternoon or tomorrow morning, and going to the temple, which was elevated, but no hint or suggestion was heard as to the identity of any of the men upon whom the additional honors would be bestowed.

It was said today that although there are thirteen vacancies in the supreme council, only twenty of them would be filled at this session. Elevation to the supreme council is bestowed for meritorious, handsome, and noble service, and the council always gives long consideration before making a selection.

The Royal Order of Scotland, which conferred its degree on eighty candidates in Scottish Rite Cathedral, Third and E streets, last night, will hold its banquet at the Shoreham Hotel tonight. May Masons of high rank from all over the United States will be guests at the dinner.
