Announcement made today by officials of the Interscholastic Basketball League and Catholic University that the Arcade, Fourteenth street and Park road northwest, will be used for basketball games during the winter.

The schoolboy circuit will play thirty games in the big dance auditorium and Catholic University will stage its twelve or thirteen home battles on the big floor.

The school circuit will probably be increased to six teams. Central's application is to be acted upon at a meeting to be held Monday night at the Army and Navy Preparatory School.

Catholic University will play its games at night. It is understood, and the school league will stage its battles in the afternoon.

After a most disappointing performance against Tech a week ago, Western pleased its staunch admirers by drawing with Business 8 to 6 in a spectacular and closely contested Georgetown Field yesterday.

Wore "Prince Alberts" When Golfers Started

St. Andrew's Club Got Into Action in 1888 and Is Father of All American Organizations—Women Are Barred From All Participation.

The beginning of American golf is usually set down as November 18, 1888, when John Reid, the "Father of American Golf," joined with six other enterprising and enthusiastic gentlemen and formed the St. Andrew's Golf Club.

The real start was somewhat earlier. Robert Lockhart returned from his annual trip to Scotland in the fall of 1882 and happened to meet John Reid on the street in Yonkers, he informed him that he had brought from Scotland some implements for playing a new game called "golf," and invited him to come to his residence and try the game in the back yard.

These two men constructed an improvised six-hole course in a pasture belonging to J. Tallmadge, another resident of Yonkers. Tallmadge was invited to join the circle of players for three reasons—he was a good fellow, he became a remarkably well looked after, and he owned the golf course.

The number of golfers at this time was perhaps half a dozen, and there were only fourteen or fifteen sticks in the country, all owned and used by this group. Those sticks had rings of different color painted on them to distinguish the clubs of one player from those of another and also to tell the clubs apart for the players of those days were not so familiar with the matter of color as we are today.

About 1888 the players had become too numerous for the pasture links, and a new six-hole course was laid out on the east bank of the Hudson river, where now some of the finest golf courses in the country are situated.

The roster of the club members reads like who's who in America. John Reid, Andrew Carnegie has the same advantage at St. Andrew's that Francis Outmet enjoys at Brookline. Bobb has collected the names of the members of the club of St. Andrew's players to move to the present location at Mt. Hope, where an eighteen-hole course was laid out, and he has remained almost unchanged to this day.

500,635 Bales of Cotton Consumed During Oct.

A Census cotton report issued today showed 500,635 bales, exclusive of lint, consumed during October, compared with 431,829 bales in 1914; 1,345,749 bales held in manufacturing establishments on October 31, against 1,252,525 last year, and 4,274,754 bales in public storage and in cotton warehouses against 3,777,601 in 1914.
