

### FINISH PLANS TODAY FOR SCOUT CAMPAIGN

To Be Announced at Buffet Supper Attended by Hundred Prominent Men.

One hundred representative Washington business and professional men will gather at a buffet supper at the Willard tonight when final plans will be announced for the campaign to raise \$50,000 with which to finance the Boy Scout movement here for the next three years.

Invitations have been sent out to prominent citizens and they are expected to lend their moral support and influence to the Scout movement, and to the campaign for funds and new members. President Wilson and Secretary Tumulty were invited, but replied that business would prevent their participation, although they were both heartily in sympathy with the Scout program and wished the movement success.

**To "Set Stage" Tonight.**  
The dinner tonight will be featured by several addresses. W. J. B. Houston, national Scout commissioner, who will conduct the campaign which begins Monday and ends Wednesday, and several other high officials of the national organization of Scouts, will speak. The names of campaign leaders will be announced, and the stage completely set for the whirlwind three-day campaign.

Commissioner Houston today had seven large thermometers placed at prominent street corners. The thermometers, about ten feet high, will be used to record the progress of the campaign. They have been placed on the American National Bank Building, on the G. A. R. Building, Boy Scout headquarters, in New York avenue between Fourteenth and Fifteenth streets, on W. H. Moses & Sons store, Eleventh and F streets, at Thirtieth street and Pennsylvania avenue, and two on the Corcoran Building.

All persons interested in the campaign will be able to learn the amount subscribed each day by consulting the thermometers. The enterprising campaigners promise to keep the mercury rising rapidly.

**Scout Parade Tomorrow.**  
Tomorrow afternoon the 1,200 Boy Scouts of Washington will parade from the Peace Monument to Seventeenth street and Pennsylvania avenue and return. The parade will begin at 2:45 o'clock. Hugh L. Taylor, field Scout executive of the Washington Council of Boy Scouts, will be grand marshal. He has appointed as aides Scoutmasters A. W. Davis, P. L. Harries, Lewis Johnson, Allen Whittington, Walter E. Marsh, John E. Bangs, and Homer Edson.

Shortly after the parade disbanded several hundred Scouts will go to Seventh street and Pennsylvania avenue and the Belasco Theater lot, where they will give exhibitions of first-aid work, signaling, fire-building without the use of matches, drilling, and other features of Scout work.

**Stallings Chosen Head Of Feed Control Officials**

R. E. Stallings today was elected president of the Association of Feed Control Officials at their closing session at the Raleigh. J. K. Haywood, of the Bureau of Chemistry, Department of Agriculture, was re-elected as a member of the executive committee.

Other officers elected were S. K. Johnson, Columbus, Ohio, vice president; Philip S. Smith, Amherst, Mass., secretary-treasurer; J. W. Kellogg was chosen chairman of the executive committee, and W. J. Johnston, of Lafayette, Ind., will serve with Mr. Haywood on the committee.

The morning was devoted to the consideration of executive business. The selection of the next place of meeting is to be decided by a mail vote of members.

### MOTHER OF CABARET BRIDE COLLAPSES

NEW YORK, Nov. 19.—Al Davis, the cabaret dancer, and Mrs. Al Davis, who until Wednesday night was Eugenia Kelly, came through to New York after their marriage in Elkton, Md. They stopped long enough from their honeymoon for Mrs. Davis to see her mother, Mrs. Edward Kelly, at her apartment at 115 East Sixty-third street, and leave her unaccompanied in a state of nervous collapse. They attended the performance of "The Eternal Magdalene" later.

The couple were on the through train from Washington. Mrs. Davis arrived at her mother's apartment alone in a taxicab. She had taken the taxi around the corner, leaving her husband to meet her later. When she left the apartment she carried two suit cases and appeared much disturbed.

"I don't know where Eugenia is going and I don't care," said Mrs. Kelly over the telephone afterward. "I told her she could pack her suit cases and go. My threats against Al Davis still hold good."

A little later it was learned from a neighbor that Mrs. Kelly had collapsed entirely and been placed in bed under a doctor's care.

John F. McIntyre, Mrs. Kelly's counsel, said that the action against Davis could be taken without Mrs. Kelly's orders. He said he knew of no plans.

The Rev. Henry W. Carr, of Elkton, Maryland's Gretta Green, who performed the ceremony after two other ministers had refused, telephoned yesterday to express his regrets that he had done so.
