

HUNDREDS OF P.O. INSPECTORS TO WAGE WAR ON PLOTTERS

Chain of Indictments Expected to Follow Conference Here of U. S. Attorney Marshall and Attorney General.

Evidence in Cases of von Rintelen, Labor Peace Council, and Others Is Scrutinized Carefully At Meeting.

A program of action to back up the President's announced intention to "crush with the hand of power creatures of passion, disloyalty and anarchy," was mapped out today.

Following a Cabinet officers' conference late yesterday at Secretary of State Lansing's office, at which co-operation in a vigorous campaign to stamp out criminal conspiracies, was discussed, United States District Attorney Marshall, of New York, conferred here today with Attorney General Gregory.

Marshall went over the evidence in various bomb plot conspiracies, the von Rintelen case and other indictments pending. Evidence against David Lamar, the "Wolf of Wall Street," and others of the labor peace council, was also submitted by Marshall.

A chain of indictments was expected to follow the return of the New York district attorney. The first onslaught in the Administration's campaign was expected to be staged there.

INSPECTORS TO AID.

Agencies of a half dozen Federal departments today were in motion against hatched conspirators. On every hand there was evidence of determination to prove that the warning of the President was not a mere play on words.

Hundreds of postoffice inspectors were enlisted with other Government secret service agencies in the campaign. While by law their power is limited to postal violations, it is believed they will be able to furnish much valuable information to the Department of Justice.

The aid of Congress will soon be invoked. Attorney General Gregory is having bills drafted to reach crimes and offenses not covered by present statutes. These will be submitted soon to the Senate and House Judiciary Committee.

REPORT TOMORROW ON SCHOOL "FRATS"

Eastern High Committee to Put Case Up to Association Without Recommendation.

Final report on the extended investigation of secret societies at Eastern High School will be made tomorrow evening to the Home and School Association of that school.

This report will be made by the same committee, headed by Henry A. Hesse, that last April presented a sensational report which charged that at least one girl had quit school because she had been "turned down" by a sorority, and that many children were humiliated because they were not invited to join the societies. Another charge was that the societies levied a heavy financial burden upon their members and their parents.

This report did not satisfy the association, and a more extensive investigation was ordered.

The committee then arranged a questionnaire and sent it to all parents of children in the third and fourth years. These replies, it is understood, have been tabulated and the committee also gathered statistics concerning the fraternities and societies of other cities.

Previously the committee had recommended that the secret societies be abolished, but this time it will present its report without recommendations.

On the committee, besides Mr. Hesse, are Miss May Johnson, Mrs. A. H. Smith, Claus J. Schwartz and H. H.weeney.

MISS FOLEY LAUGHS AT KIDNAPING FEAR

Former Labor's National Peace Council Typist Says She Wasn't Spirited to New York

Miss Catherine Foley, a stenographer living at 1022 Eighth street northeast, today laughed over the fears of former Congressman Fowler of Illinois, that she had been spirited away from Washington and taken to New York in connection with the Federal grand jury investigation of the alleged unlawful activities of Labor's National Peace Council.

Mr. Fowler was in New York yesterday trying to locate the young typist. He charged Government agents with having taken her from her home to New York against her will. In the meantime, Miss Foley was in Washington, having returned here after testifying before the grand jury in New York.

Miss Foley was employed as a stenographer in the Washington office of Labor's National Peace Council shortly after its organization last summer and worked for the organization for several months. She was summoned to testify as to the character of letters dictated to her and the persons, factories and organizations to whom the letters were sent. The Government introduced this evidence presumably with an idea of substantiating its charge that the council was engaged in forming strikes in munitions plants and working up disension in the ranks of labor organizations whose members were employed in arms, cartridge and shell factories in this country.

The young typist declined today to say anything about her testimony before the grand jury. She did say, however, that she was handed a subpoena at her home on Monday and left immediately for New York, where she testified on Tuesday. She returned to Washington yesterday morning.

Former Congressman Fowler, who is said to have been one of the moving spirits in Labor's National Peace Council, informed the District Attorney in New York that the young woman's parents were frantic over her alleged mysterious disappearance shortly after being approached by Government agents, and they had requested him to make efforts to locate her.

Miss Foley said her parents were

fully aware of her being summoned to New York, but they may have inquired of Mr. Fowler as to the reason for her being subpoenaed. She said she went to New York of her own volition and was treated with the utmost courtesy and consideration by the Government agents, district attorney, and members of the grand jury.
