MRS. BAKER'S PLANS CAUSE REGRET HERE

Decision Not to Come to Washington At Present Disappointing to Many.

The decision of Mrs. Newton D. Baker, wife of the newly appointed Secretary of War, to delay her coming to Washington has caused considerable regret.

Washingtonians, who are brought into close touch with the members of the Cabinet and their families, always are deeply interested in a new addition to the little group, and Mr. Baker has a particularly interesting family.

Mrs. Baker, who was Miss Elizabeth Wells Leopold, of Pottstown, Pa., is a great favorite in her old home, and during her residence there was a leader in musical matters, church work, and philanthropic activities. Since her marriage to Mr. Baker in 1912 she has returned for frequent visits, usually taking her children with her.

Three Interesting Children. The Bakers have three children, who will be an interesting addition to the young people of the Cabinet circle when Mrs. Baker finally takes up residence in Washington.

It is on their account, in order that there be no interruption of their studies, that Mrs. Baker has decided to remain in Cleveland for the present.

Miss Elizabeth Newton, who is ten years old, and is known to her intimates as Nettie—her mother's nickname also—called Jack, and Peggy, aged four, whose proper name is Margaret.

Mrs. Baker met her husband at the marriage of a college chum to a Cleveland man. She was his bridemaid and Mr. Baker was best man. That was in 1901. They were married in 1902.

Mrs. Baker was graduated from Wilson College in 1899 and later was attached to the college teaching staff as instructor in music and painting.

She sings charmingly and whenever she returns to Pottstown she is credited with service as soloist at Holy Trinity Memorial Chapel, of which her brother, Ralph Leopold, is organist.

Mr. Leopold was studying music in Berlin when the war broke out, but returned at once to this country.

Has Brother Here. Mrs. Baker is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Leopold, of Pottstown, and her grandfather, the late J. D. Streeter, was one of the pioneer newspaper publishers of the Schuylkill valley. She has a brother in Washington, Roy Leopold, who is connected with the United States Geological Survey.
