

CLERKS' FIGHT ON BORLAND RIDER IS PRACTICALLY WON

Chances Decidedly Against Substitute Offered When Amendment Was Quashed.

RULING GUARANTEES THIS

Congressmen Can't See How New Clause Can Fail to Be Ruled Out.

Point Sustained. After discussing a number of precedents, Chairman Crisp rendered the following ruling sustaining the Mondell point of order against the original Borland provision.

"It was the practice under the rules of the House that legislation is not in order on an appropriation bill unless it comes within the exception known as the Holman rule.
