


Simple Method of Hiding a Gravy Spot on Your Vest

PENNSYLVANIA WILL BE REPRESENTED IN BIG BOWLING GAMES

Philadelphia and Other Cities Promise Entries for A. C. B. A. Tourney Here.

Philadelphia bowlers are coming to the big A. C. B. A. tournament in bunches. At least thirteen teams from Philadelphia alone will be found shooting at the maple, while Wilkesbarre, Scranton, and Reading will also have representatives. The tournament is being held at the Capital Hill alleys. The Casino team of the National Capital League is also holding a three-day meet, beginning today and continuing through Thursday. The team will enter the tournament. Princess Tra-La-La last night entertained twelve hundred Masons and their families at the National Theater, where a big performance was held to raise funds to enter the twenty Masonic teams in the coming A. C. B. A. tourney. Masonic officialdom occupied the boxes. Potentate L. Whiting Estes entertained in two of the boxes. J. H. Richards, Jr., chairman of the committee in charge of the occasion, other members of which were H. B. Malley, H. J. Sauer, Kirk S. Miller, L. McGraw, Albert Haas, Bert V. Wolfe, E. D. Stocking, H. A. Meals, George E. Rohman, and H. B. Hall.

The Elks Club team and the McCloskey Allies, of Wilkesbarre, Pa., will journey to the Capital with blood in their eyes, while the Elks Club team and Watson's Allies, of Reading, and the K. C. team, of Scranton. George M. Moss and Joseph Travis were appointed to confer with railroad headquarters in an effort to secure special accommodations for the trip.

The tournament management has announced that prizes will be awarded on ladies' night in all classes. These prizes are offered solely for competition in the women's events. Entries for the women's teams are expected to toe the mark on the special night in their honor.

The secretary has received a check, covering entrance fees, for another candidate-in team. The team is comprised of local bowlers. An executive meeting of the Washington Tournament Company was held yesterday in the rooms of the Chamber of Commerce, to hear committee reports and discuss the question of the disposition of the various concessions to be awarded. Promise of the large crowds that will attend the tourney have caused numerous applications for concessions to erect stands and stores in the Conant building during the three weeks or more that the competition will last.

Applications are being considered for luncheon, a cigar stand, a souvenir booth, dancing, skee-ball alleys, a Seeing-Washington booth, a photographic studio, and four telephone booths. Management has announced that they will not consider any concessions that would in any way enhance or detract from the public.

The final report of the stands committee was approved. The report calls for the erection of a stand at the upper end of the alleys, with a seating capacity of 1,000.

The Capital Hill team is conducting a three-ball tournament throughout this week.

CHARLOTTESVILLE, March 14.-Capt. Ray Morgan, of the Washington club's bowling team, today forwarded the official entry of his team to the Atlantic Coast Bowling Association in Washington. THREE-POINT SHOW EXPECTED IN APRIL

Premium List and Entry Blanks Out For Washington Kennel Club's Exhibition.

The coming bench show of the Washington Kennel Club will be a three-point show is confidently expected by the committee in charge. The premium list and entry blanks are out and entries will begin pouring in before the week is out. Entries close March 20, the show being staged at the Washington Riding and Hunt Club, Twenty-second and P streets northwest, April 12, 14, and 15.

The best judges ever in charge of thoroughbreds in this section have been obtained for this fifth annual exhibition of the Washington Kennel Club. G. Muss-Arnolt, of Tuckahoe, N. Y., will judge great danes, grayhounds, pointers, setters, English sheepdogs, wolfhounds, mastiffs, St. Bernards, and miscellaneous classes.

Charles W. Barney, of New Bedford, Mass., will judge foxhounds, with George A. Flammer, of Newark, N. J., in charge of beagles, Dr. H. B. Kohler, of Philadelphia, will judge sporting spaniels.

F. Louis Hauptner, of Philadelphia, will judge dachshunds, Mrs. Halstead Wainwright, of Virginia, will judge German shepherds and dalmatians, Mrs. May H. McCurdy, of New Brunswick, N. J., will judge collies.

Charles W. Barney, of Philadelphia, will make awards among bulldogs, German Shepherds, Manchester terriers, and Scottish terriers.

Three hundred dollars is offered outright in special prizes, this being the largest special list ever made up by the local club.

Beagles, bulldogs, Boston terriers and Airedales are expected to contest for the honor of the largest entry for any single breed, but there will also be a large representation of spaniels, German shepherds, collies, setters, Pomeranians, foxhounds and cocker spaniels.
