

PLANS FOR MOBILIZATION OF MUNITION PLANTS

Congressman Goods Wants U. S. to Have All Information in Case of War.

A plan whereby the Government could mobilize the manufacturing plants of the country for production of munitions and war material in event of national emergency will be offered in the House in connection with the bill by Congressman Goods of Iowa.

Mr. Goods has prepared amendments which provide the Secretary of War shall obtain and keep on hand a complete list of all the munitions and arms factories in the country and also of all the plants capable of being readily transformed into factories for manufacture of munitions or arms.

Plans are to be prepared for the transforming of these plants into factories for making war material. Further, Mr. Goods provides that in case of war any plant which produces war material which does not sell its product to the Government at reasonable prices will be fined by the Secretary of War or any plant which refuses to transform into a factory for making munitions or arms, may be taken over by the Government upon reasonable payment.

Mr. Goods said today that such legislation would be ready to give the nation real preparedness. "I am for real preparedness without a draft," he said. "It would be well for us to follow the example of nations which have been successful in their preparations. Substantially, the plan I have provided for has been followed by Germany."

Mr. Goods also has an amendment for a Government powder factory in the interior of the country where it will not be exposed to capture.

NORTH DAKOTA IS HAVING PRIMARY

BISMARCK, N. D., March 21.—North Dakota's Presidential preference primary today developed into a fight for positions as delegates. There was no fight for the head of the ticket. Army Recruits Come Forward Slowly

Only 507 Accepted in Five Days. Take Six Months At This Rate.

Reports received by Adjutant General McCain from forty-six of the fifty-four recruiting districts, shows that only 507 men were enlisted in the United States army during the first five days of the campaign to recruit the army to war strength.

Newman Discusses Improvements and Explains Community Forum Idea.

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These men were accepted out of 2,083 applicants. The rate of enlistment shown by these figures is more than double the ordinary rate. The army recruiting service has opened a campaign to enlist 20,000 men as provided for in the Hay resolution passed recently by Congress.

While the present rate of increase in enlisting army officials, it is pointed out that unless more men offer themselves for service it will require six months to recruit the army to war strength. It will then take another six months to train the recruits before they will be equipped to join armies in the field.
