

MEAT PRICES SOAR TO NEW LEVELS

Beef, Lamb, Poultry, and Pork Increase—Veal Alone Stationary.

Once more the price of meat has gone skyward. In the past month 2 and 3 cents a pound has been added to the wholesale price of beef, lamb, pork, and 1 or 2 cents has been added to smoked meats. Veal alone seems to be holding its own. While an actual decrease in veal is reported in the wholesale market of some cities, the price remains about the same here, 16 cents a pound whole, sale, dealers state. Poultry, likewise, has shown a slight increase, about 1 cent a pound. Again, the old answer, "the war." One dealer pointed to the report that one Chicago packing house had contracted for 20,000,000 pounds of meat for the allies about two weeks ago. The rise on prices this month over March a year ago ranges from \$2 to \$2.50 a hundred. The rise over the prices last month is from \$1 to \$1.50 a hundred for both fresh and smoked meats, at the most conservative estimate. Lamb especially seems to be taking the reins in the matter of star gazing prices, and one dealer reports that "lamb is higher now than it ever has been in Washington," and it sells for from 17 to 19 cents wholesale, which is from 3 to 5 cents higher than a month ago. Beef is from 12 1/2 to 13 cents a pound, according to the representative of one great packing company, and 12 1/2 to 14, according to another. The first admits having a large supply on hand, and expects an increase at the next shipments. Pork is quoted at 16 1/2 and 17 by all dealers, and the wholesale price of smoked hams is variously quoted at from 17 to 19 cents. At that some of these figures in Washington are lower than in other cities, it was stated, because of a comparatively good supply here.

NORTHEAST SAVINGS BANK IS OPENED

New Institution Is Thrown Open for Depositors. Another bank was added to the already long list of financial institutions in Washington at 9 o'clock this morning, when the Northeast Savings Bank, a new organization, formally opened its doors to depositors. Several dozen of these already were waiting outside, eager to be among the first to open accounts, and there was a rush to the receiving teller's window. The bank is located at Fourteenth and H streets northwest, in a new building, built especially for it. John Doyle Carmody, president of the bank, said that he was much gratified by the manner in which the people of the northeast had come forward to make deposits on the opening day. "It was not surprising, however," he continued, "for this is distinctly a northeast institution, and is the only bank in this section of the city. It is only natural that the people here should take an interest in it and give it their support." The bank has been incorporated for \$100,000, and has men prominently identified with Washington's banking interests as officers and directors. Dr. Victor Esch is first vice president; John W. Hays is second vice president, and Guy Eichelberger is cashier. The directors include Luther E. Scheiner, M. J. Collins, Charles F. Miller, John Peabody, Edwin C. Jones, G. L. Baker, C. R. Talbot, and C. L. Bowman.

St. Aloysius' Choir Gives Pleasing Concert

A pleasing concert, participated in by individual members of the St. Aloysius male choir, and by the complete choir of fifty voices, was given last night at Gonzaga Hall. The choir has been rehearsing classic music under the direction of Glenn H. Ashley for several months. The program which included orchestral pieces as well as solos and choruses, was arranged by the Rev. William A. Whalen, liturgical director. The soloists included Thomas A. Cantwell, tenor; Francis A. Dougherty, bass, and Master Aloysius Sheehan, soprano.

Treasury Rates Surety Companies

Department Says National Surety Company's Statement Showed It at Top.

The involved question regarding what surety company reporting to the Treasury Department has the highest rating, has been settled by the action of the National Surety Company in not asking for a re-rating. The Treasury Department admitting that the National Surety Company had the largest combined capital and surplus as of December 31, 1915, in a letter to that company dated March 29, 1916, in which it says: "It is proper to state that the annual statement of the National Surety Company for 1915, as filed with the Treasury Department, shows a larger combined capital and surplus than the annual statement for the same year of any other surety company authorized to do business with the Government, but that deductions of certain items by the Government as non-admitted assets under its regulations, resulted in placing the National Surety Company second, by the amount of \$200,000, on the rating sheet published by the Treasury Department on March 1, 1916."
