

Griffmen Defeat Red Sox, 3 to 2, in Morning Game---Boehling Shows Class

JOE BOEHLING WINS MORNING CONTEST FROM CARRIGANITES

Richmond Southpaw Holds the Enemy in Check When They Threaten to Do Anything.

BOSTON, April 19.—The Griffmen showed some hitting strength in the morning game today, when they peppered George Foster freely, rushing into the lead in the fifth inning, when they shoved over two runs.

Manager Griffith decided that Joe Boehling was ready for a trial in the box, and sent him against the world's champions. The Richmond southpaw was a bit wild, but got along pretty well.

The weather was fair and cold, with about 5,000 fans scattered around the big playing space.
