GRIFFMEN TO HEAR NOTED EVANGELIST OVER IN BALTIMORE

E. Fateem Foster Will Lead His Team Mates to Monumental City for Meeting.

YANKEES LACK TEAMWORK

Not Till Visitors Get Together Will They Show At Their Real Strength.

The Griffmen are going to Baltimore in a body to listen to Billy Sunday make one of his famous addresses next Sunday. They will be led by that doughty little warrior, E. Fateem Foster, and the interest being shown in this small adventure is proved by the fact that full half the squad will make the trip to the Monumental City.

Manager Griffith, though he has not decided the question yet, may accompany his boys to Baltimore to hear the noted evangelist.

"I made all arrangements by wire from Boston," explained Griff today, "and the boys are looking forward to the trip. Most of them are going over Saturday night, returning Sunday night."

Now that the opening game is out of the way, Business Manager "Perduke" Fowler announces that all games throughout the season will begin at 3:30 o'clock, except on Saturdays when the starting time will be 3 o'clock. The only time games will begin any earlier than 3 o'clock will be when the teams must catch certain trains.

Dan Tipple, the highest priced twirler in the minors last year, was today released to Baltimore.

The Yankees called at the White House this morning, meeting President Wilson. They then visited the Treasury.

The Yankees, though overwhelmed in their first game here for 1916, show a lot of latent power. They easily show themselves dangerous contenders, who should constantly become stronger as they work through the schedule.

The Yankees have all the weaknesses of team hastily brought together, and showed against a team that has been playing for four seasons. There is a lack of co-ordination, particularly in the infield. However, Geddon and Baker are playing their first season with the Yankees and it takes time to get an infield working like machinery.

Lee Magee, while fast and most aggressive, will have to get a working agreement with Frits Maise before that Yankee trio of gardeners will show at their best. Maise dropped Morgan's fly ball yesterday in the seventh largely because Magee romped over against him.

It is more a want of experience to blame than anything else for the diamond that is needed by the Yankees. If they can cling to a high ranking until July 4, they should prove most dangerous from then on, for every day will see their fielding and running machinery looking better and better.

Joe Geddon has developed considerably since playing with the Griffmen. The California Catamount was a green lad while here and now he has gained confidence. His triple yesterday sailed out over Shank's head viciously. Joe has all his former speed and looks like a big leaguer.

Geddon received a warm welcome from the fans yesterday and he had to doff his cap when the applause rattled out in the second inning when he came to the plate.

There were two instances of poor teamwork by the Yankees in the opener. Once, with Johnson on third base and Moeller on first Foster shoved one back at Keating. The Yankee pitcher, forgetting all about Johnson, hesitated between tossing to second or first, finally throwing out Foster. Of course, Johnson scored.

Magee romped far over into center-field when Morgan raised a high fly to Maise. Perhaps Frits should have shouted. Perhaps he did anyway, but the two outfielders collided and Morgan reached second base.

All Washington buzzed today with favorable comment for Carl Sawyer. This kid has made for himself a home in the hearts of the fans.

No funny man ever with any ball club equaled this youngster. His leadership of the band in the opener was a work of art. He twirled his baseball baton with all the eclat of a minstrel leader on parade. Just to prove his ability he gave a few steps of a dance. He was graceful, too, in this dance, not clumsy.

Of course, Sawyer's antics on the lines were good and brought much applause, but his leadership of the band, being unexpected as well as clever, was his best work of the day.
