

the United States against raids of this kind. This is the first time since the Spanish-American war that a President of the United States has called upon the National Guard to aid the regular army in an international crisis.

Further Call Awaits Developments. Whether further organizations of the National Guard are to be called out will depend upon developments.

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Arizona has a total of 897 uniformed militiamen. Of the militia are enlisted men, 30 regimental and company commanders, and 8 general and staff officers. There are 58,925 reservists subject to call.

New Mexico has 972 officers and men, 92 of whom are enlisted men, 31 regimental and company commanders, and 8 general and staff officers. There are 80,476 militia reservists in Texas.

Can Protect Border. The national guard and the regulars will, he believes, be able to protect the border. 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Call To State Guards Pleases Leaders From States on the Border

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MEXICAN TROOPS OF BORDER ROADS Press Dispatches Say Measure Taken to Prevent More Soldiers Crossing Line.

NEW YORK, May 9.—The New York Times printed the following special dispatch from Mexico City today: Measures have been taken to prevent the sending of more American troops into Mexican territory, according to official dispatches made here tonight.
