

### DENIES FORUMS IN NEW YORK CLOSED

Member of School Board of Metropolis Calls Reports of Action Misleading.

Reports of the action of the New York school board in regard to the continuation of the New York schools of the labor forum and the Civic League of Brooklyn are characterized as "a trifle misleading" in a letter from Raymond B. Fosdick to E. J. Ward.

Mr. Fosdick is the member of the New York Board of Education who has upheld the use of the schools by the forum, and Mr. Ward, of the United States Bureau of Education, has been backing the movement to get forums out of the Washington schools through the provisions of the Hollis-Johnson bill.

Owing to the attacks alleged to have been made on the flag, and other disturbances, seven members of the New York board at a recent meeting, voted to oust the forum at once.

Mr. Ward contends that the objections found against the forum in New York would not be possible here under the provisions of the Hollis-Johnson bill which gives the Board of Education supervision over them.

The newspaper clipping referred to in Mr. Fosdick's letter contains a denial of the alleged flag insult incident. Mr. Fosdick is quoted as saying:

"Throughout the labor forum has been an innocent victim, suffering from insincere attacks and distorted stories."

### CARY INTRODUCES A NEW LOAN BILL

Would Provide an Interest Rate of 3 Per Cent a Month.

A bill proposing that loan companies and pawn brokers in the District be allowed to charge 3 per cent per month interest on loans up to \$50, and 2 per cent interest on loans above that amount was introduced in the House yesterday by Congressman Cary, a Republican member of the District Committee.

### WILSON DETERMINED IN RUBLEE'S BEHALF

Senator Hollis' Desire for Reconsideration Indicates Administration's Wishes.

That President Wilson is determined that the nomination of Federal Trade Commissioner Rublee should be confirmed by the Senate, despite yesterday's setback, was indicated today when Senator Hollis, the Administration's leader in this fight, announced he would press his vote for a reconsideration of the case at once.

When Senator Cummins, who, it is said, would have voted with other progressive Republicans for confirmation, returns from Oregon, and when a half dozen absent Democrats have been summoned to Washington, a new vote will be sought.

The Administration seeks the endorsement of Rublee almost as much for its effect on the pending Brandeis appointment as for the sake of the appointee. It is generally believed that many of the Democrats who made possible Rublee's defeat yesterday, are known to hope privately for the defeat of Brandeis, and leaders favoring the latter appointment are concerned about the precedent which an Administration defeat in the Rublee case might establish.

### Sayville Radio Chief Leaves Post to Wed

NEW YORK, May 16.—Ludwig Batterman, superintendent and chief engineer of the German radio station at Sayville, has been ordered to leave to marry Miss Ency. He passed the censor safely and will receive a salute of twenty guns from the United States marine guards upon reporting for duty this morning.

### COMPROMISE URGED ON NEW HOSPITAL

East Washington Citizens Would Have Commission Investigate Need of Institution.

Resolutions recommending that the pending District appropriation bill be amended to provide for the appointment by the President of a commission of three to investigate the need of a municipal hospital were adopted by the

East Washington Citizens' Association last night. The resolution was drafted by a joint committee composed of the presidents of four citizens' associations—Dr. A. Edwards, of the Lincoln Park Association; A. G. Hermann, of the Southeast Association; Evan H. Tucker, of the North-east Washington Association, and Dr. Charles M. Emmons, of the East Washington Association.
