

COMMUNITY SINGING WINS WIDE APPROVAL

Mothers' Congress and Many Organizations Indorse Work. Noted Singers Volunteer.

Community singing and the work of the Community Singing Society of Washington, was discussed by the Mothers' Congress at the Raleigh Hotel today.

The discussion developed that the operatic ambitions of the community singers have been indorsed by a large number of the civic organizations of the District.

The Board of Education and half a dozen other organizations have given their hearty support.

Announcement was made that the efforts of the Washington musicians also have been indorsed in other musical centers.

Two of the best known light opera singers of the country, John C. Philip, baritone, and Harry Myers, opera comedian, came to the city yesterday from New York and volunteered to help in the production of "Martha."

Mr. Philip will sing the part of Plunket and Mr. Myers will be Sir Tristan. Philip will be remembered in Washington as the original "chocolate soldier" in the first production of the opera, "The Chocolate Soldier" in this city.

It has appeared here many times with the Savage organizations. Mr. Myers has appeared here a number of times also, having sung the part he will sing with the community singers on numerous occasions.

Miss Schippert to Sing. Miss Viola Louise Schippert will be Lady Harriet with both casts that will sing the opera.

SEEK FUND OF \$4,000 TO REPAIR HIGHWAY

A campaign to raise \$4,000 as Washington's contribution to a fund for the repair of the section of the Washington-Richmond highway known as Chopp-wanic swamp has been launched by the District of Columbia branch of the American Automobile Association.

Former Judge Martin A. Knapp, of the United States Commerce Court, president of the club's advisory board, has appointed as a committee to supervise the raising of the fund Dr. C. Hart Merriam, J. Harry Cunningham, and the Rev. John Van Schalk, Jr.

The former will benefit, the promoters of the project contend, through the establishment of another good road over which to tour, while commercial interests of the Capital will be furthered through the bringing to Washington of thousands of tourists who now annually detour on travel between the North and the South to avoid this particular stretch of bad roadway.
