

PLATTSBURG CAMP MUST MOVE TODAY

"Rookies" Compelled to Retreat to Sandy Ground When Battle With Mud Is Lost.

PLATTSBURG, June 12.—The battle against mud which the citizen soldiers in the military training camp here have been waging since the camp started last Monday has been decided. The "rookies" have been ordered to withdraw to a camp north of the present one, which was the site of last year's camp.

Orders were received here yesterday from Maj. Gen. Leonard Wood to make the change. Major Harrison Hall, in command of the provisional battalion of coast artillery, sent out mounted orderlies through the streets of Plattsburg to call back his men from the first day off they had since the camp started in order that they might finish construction of the camp. All recruits who had not left for trips to Montreal or Au Sable Chasm were put to work.

The change is being made today, and the "rookies" will have some practical work in construction when they pitch the 40 tents needed for officers and men in the regiment. The stakes already have been driven by Major Hall's men.

The change in site was made when it was found that the ground, which, before the present rainy season, had seemed to be an excellent camp site, was in danger of being wet the whole month. All week the men have been suffering from wet feet, and the carloads of cinders and sand which were dumped on the camp grounds seemed to have little effect. The character of the ground changes abruptly north of the first camp, and the new camp will be built on sandy soil, which keeps dry all the time.

Major Sees a Benefit.
Major Murray, the camp commander, made the following statement today in regard to the change:

high ebb, it was decided to change the camp site to higher ground, rather than take a chance on further inclement weather. There is nothing more depressing than continued rains such as we have had for the last month. The men have stood the hard test remarkably well, but there is a limit, and we don't want to be placed so that the limit may be reached. Then, too, such weather as we have been having is not conducive to good sanitary conditions.

"Tent pitching and the building of camp sites is a part of our curriculum, and the work the men are doing today falls exactly in line with their regular course of instruction."

The camp which is being abandoned will probably be used for the second camp in July. There is a shortage of land near the present site for the four regiments, totaling about 6,000 men, which are expected here in July.

Pioneers attacked about 250 members of the First Battalion Saturday night. The men affected were in Companies A, B, C and D. Canned beans, it is supposed, were the cause of the sickness. None of the men was sent to the camp hospital, but most of them remained in bed during the forenoon.

Some Got Away.
Trips to Montreal, Ausable Chasm, and other points of interest near by were made yesterday by the "rookies," who obtained leave to be away until 10:30 to-night. The rule for all to be in bed by 10:30 p. m. is being strictly enforced. Major Murray's theory is that if the men stay up later they not only do not get enough sleep themselves, but they are apt to wake up others in camp.

Howard Acton, a Washington newspaper man, who has been at the camp in the interest of the Military Training Camp Association, was slightly injured tonight when he was struck by an automobile in the road in front of the camp. He suffered bad bruises, but was not hurt badly enough to require his removal to a hospital.

Johnny Hayes, of Machine Gun Troop F, Second Battery, who defeated "Duck" Johnson, of Troop K, in a boxing bout last night, has issued a challenge to meet any "rookie" at 142 pounds, with a wager of \$100 that he will defeat all comers. The challenge has not been answered.


