

### ANACOSTIA TO END CARNIVAL TONIGHT

Fete Will Be Brought to Close Despite Weather Conditions. Band Concert and Dancing.

Already postponed until tonight because of rain last Thursday, Anacostia will not allow the weather to interfere with the latter part of its carnival a second time.

### Coroner to Inquire Into Bridge Crash

Coroner Nevitt will conduct an inquest late today over six-year-old Helen Johnson, fatally injured early this morning in a motorcycle crash on the Pennsylvania avenue bridge. The child's mother, Mrs. Alice Johnson, and her father, Gustaf Johnson, a marine, stationed at the navy yard, are in Casualty Hospital, seriously injured as the result of the accident.

The child was with her mother in the "side car" of Johnson's motorcycle, all of them returning from a run out in Prince George's county about 12:30 o'clock last night.

While crossing the Pennsylvania avenue bridge, the police say, the motorcycle collided with a wagon driven by Robert M. Thompson, of Clinton, Md.
