STREET PAVING CONTRACT AWARDED. Warner-Quinlan Concern Will Resurface Roadways for Two Years.

The Commissioners today awarded to the Warner-Quinlan Asphalt Company, of Syracuse, N. Y., a two years' contract for resurfacing asphalt roadways in the District.

Bids were opened at the District building June 1. The price named by the Warner-Quinlan Company was \$1.81 a square yard for reduced asphalt, 6 cents lower than the price named by the Crawford Paving Company, of Washington, the present contractor.

The contract calls for the expenditure of approximately \$75,000 annually. The Warner-Quinlan Company holds the present contract for laying new asphalt roadways. Bids for the new work provided for under the pending District appropriation bill will be advertised after July 1.
