

HELD ON CHARGE OF SHOOTING AT WIFE

Police Also Probe Accusation Husband Forced Her to Drink Poisoned Wine.

Maurice Carpenter, a machinist at the Washburn Steen, Plant, is detained at the second precinct on a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon. His wife, Mrs. Elizabeth Carpenter, is in Emergency Hospital suffering from what is diagnosed as atropine and morphine poisoning, but is expected to recover.

Her husband denies the charge. He declares, according to the police, that the woman herself poisoned the wine. Captain Doyle said today that shortly after 8 o'clock yesterday his precinct received a call from the Ninth street address. He dispatched two officers.

At the hospital, the police say they were told that the woman showed symptoms of morphine and atropine poisoning, and that when she recovered sufficiently to talk, she charged her husband with having forced her to drink poisoned wine.

Husband Under Arrest. Policeman Thomas Quinlan, on this information, again visited the Ninth street house and there placed Maurice Carpenter under arrest.

From the house was also taken an almost empty port wine bottle from which the woman is supposed to have taken the drink. This was given to Harry Evans, of the narcotic squad, who is arranging today for its analysis.

Evans visited the woman in the hospital. He said:

"She told me her husband on Monday shot at her. Yesterday she said he had been drinking, and although she begged him to stay at home, he insisted on going out, returning with the wine, which he later forced her to drink at the point of his pistol.

"Mrs. Carpenter said that a short time after she had taken the wine, she began to feel queer. Then she noticed that her grip, in which she carries her nursing outfit and hypodermics, was open. She started for the bathroom to take an emetic, but fainted on the way. Some of the occupants of the house called the ambulance."

Admits Shooting at Wife. Replying to these accusations, the prisoner, according to Captain Doyle, of the second precinct, denies he shot the wife, but admits that he pointed at the woman. Upon his arraignment, he has been charged with assault with a dangerous weapon, and is being held pending an investigation.

The captain states that the prisoner says the woman herself put the poison in the wine, and drank it following a quarrel yesterday afternoon. At the hospital today physicians said that Mrs. Carpenter has a splendid chance for recovery.

Asks \$5 Fee For Sitting Up With Corpse

RIVERHEAD, L. I., June 21.—"Five dollars for sitting up with the corpse" is one of the unusual items of expense which appears on the bill filed here today by George A. White, as administrator of the late Lupis J. Feldhus's estate. Mr. White also seeks to collect a fee of \$25 in recompense for the trouble he was put to in attending the late Mr. Feldhus's funeral.

His accounting was presented today to the surrogate. Authorities doubt whether he will receive the two unusual fees.

King George Pays \$3.00 A Pound For Russian Tea

LONDON, June 21.—Many years ago when King George was on a visit to the Czar he contracted a liking for Russian tea, and the habit still sticks. King George drinks Russian tea and pays a big price for it. His last tea bill was at the rate of \$3 per pound.

But the King only drinks tea once a day, at breakfast, so that a pound of tea lasts him quite a long time. The Queen drinks China tea, at \$1.50 a pound. Queen Mary takes tea at breakfast, in the afternoon, and sometimes before going to bed.

Vorwaerts Objects to Celebration of Victories

BERLIN (via London), June 21.—Vorwaerts publishes the text of a resolution issued by the Hessian ministry of public instruction ordering a school holiday for the children as a reward for their services during the period when subscriptions for the fourth war loan were being collected.

The Socialist journal does not like the idea, and writes: "As a rule, even the announcement of a victory should not be celebrated by the suspension of school work on the following day. When a victory of importance is announced, the school hours its significance may immediately be explained to the children, who then may be dismissed for the rest of the day. That should be enough for the cultivation of patriotic sentiments in an educationally unobjectionable way. Only very great and decisive events would justify a whole holiday."

\$10,000,000 SUIT OF GUGGENHEIM STARTS

Five Brothers Try Vainly to Postpone Trial of William's Action.

MINNEOLA, L. I., June 21.—In spite of a strong attempt by the development of a postponement of the \$10,000,000 suit of William Guggenheim against his five brothers went to trial here yesterday morning before Supreme Court Justice Callaghan and a jury.

The defendants are Isaac, Daniel, Morris, Solomon, and Simon Guggenheim and the suit is based on allegations that the five brothers induced William to sign over to them his rights in the Chugwickanna Prospect, a copper mine in Chile, which later proved to be immensely valuable. William alleges that the five knew the value of the mine but that it was represented to be of minor value of far less value.

William D. Guthrie and Samuel Untermeyer of counsel for the defendants urged on the court that two of their important witnesses are in South America and cannot be produced before the trial until the month. Their defense would be materially weakened by the absence of these witnesses, the said counsel argued. Captain Callaghan refused to postpone the case and the jury was quickly selected.

Stephen C. Baldwin, in opening, said that the five brothers had virtually "chloroformed" William when they made deals relating to the properties of the Guggenheim firm. He told how the family, at first manufacturers of embroideries, finally got into the smelting business. William studied mineralogy at the University of Pennsylvania, he said, and became an expert. The other brothers were financiers. William was sent into Mexico where he made the Guggenheim interests pay.

After nine years of this service William returned to New York, said Baldwin. There was no place for him with the Guggenheim firm, so he entered the stock market. He paid little attention to the firm's affairs, did not participate in all the enterprises of his brothers, but at the same time as a member of the firm he was liable for a share of the losses. Whenever the brothers would want a waiver, said Mr. Baldwin, William would sign it. He explored the mines, and that they fraudulently and wrongfully concealed the great worth of the mines from him.

On some of the defendants said that William had been taken in on several deals by his brothers. When the firm lost William was not asked to pay his share of the losses, said the attorney, but when the firm won he shared the winnings. On one occasion William's share was \$20,000.

The case will continue tomorrow.

Plate Printers Will Hold Reunion Smoker

For the first time in nine years all the plate printers within the District of Columbia are expected to meet at a reunion smoker on Saturday next.

The Plate Printers' Union, Local No. 2, will give an old-fashioned smoker at Elks Hall, and the reunion will be an entertainment event. John J. Deviny, president of the local union, has issued notice of the smoker, and expects a big attendance of plate printers.

RAILROAD NETWORK PLANNED BY RUSSIA

Officials Propose Expensive Developments After War—Opportunities for U. S.

NEW YORK, June 21.—Russia is making extensive plans for the development of her resources and industries after the war, according to information received by the American-Russian Chamber of Commerce.

A conference of the Russian ministers of agriculture, industry, commerce and finance of war was held in Petrograd at the invitation of the assistant minister of means of communication to consider the problems of railroad construction in Russia after the war.

The problems of the industrial development of Russia are primarily connected with the construction of suitable transportation systems. The position of Russia at present is analogous to the industrial development of the United States after the civil war. Russia needs the development and the construction of a proper system of railroad transportation in order to link up her vast area and to make possible the development of her mineral and industrial resources. The construction of the transportation systems in Russia during the present war has emphasized the railroad needs.

A prominent Russian engineer pointed out at the conference that Russia must plan for a system of railroads to link together all localities possessing potential natural wealth and that these railroads should be connected with trunk line roads in connection with emigration to Siberia and middle Asia. The conference decided that it would be necessary to construct about 25,000 miles of railroad as soon as possible, and that plans should be entered into for the construction of these lines during the next five years.

The American-Russian Chamber of Commerce has been in close touch with the development in Russia, and it believes that there is a great opportunity for American financiers and American construction companies to share in the development of railroad construction in Russia when the war ends.
