

T. R.'S PLEA TO PROGRESSIVES IS ON ITS WAY

Message Asking Progressive Support for Hughes Starts from Chicago.

EXPECTS TO WIN CONTEST

Warm Fight Between Party Wings Likely — Whitman Peace Talk Heard.

OYSTER BAY, June 25.—Theodore Roosevelt's final instructions to the majority of the Progressive national committee are on the way to Chicago, being carried by Irwin R. Kirkwood, of Kansas City; Chester H. Rowell, of California, two of the committee, and John W. McGrath, the Colonel's secretary.

Roosevelt's letter to the national committee, declining the nomination of the party he founded, which is to be presented tomorrow, is expected to cause friction between the conservative and radical wings of the committee.

Heated discussion between the two elements has been forecast for several days.

ROOSEVELT CONFIDENT.

Roosevelt, however, is confident his friends assert, that the deciding vote in the committee will favor his appeal to Progressives to support the Republican national ticket.

Kirkwood and Powell were with the Colonel most of the afternoon. Jessie H. Post, former governor of Porto Rico, also called on Roosevelt. Mr. McGrath went to New York to catch a train for Chicago soon after leaving Sagamore Hill.

It was learned today that Roosevelt has refused the requests of certain New York State Republican leaders to confer with him in his home regarding state politics. He has claimed the lid until after his letter to the Progressive national committee has been made public.

One rumor is that friends of the governor have made overtures to the Colonel seeking his support for Whitman and urging him to use his influence to reconcile the belligerent Progressives in New York, who threaten to make trouble for the state ticket.

Barred Emigrants.
Roosevelt barred these emigrants from Oyster Bay, telling them, it is said, that he might listen to them this week. After the Colonel has made known his attitude toward Hughes, he is expected to have something to say about New York State politics.

Reports have reached Roosevelt that Whitman and his supporters are saying they are not interested in what the Colonel does or says in New York State. The Colonel's friends, however, would not be surprised if Whitman called at Sagamore Hill to show his desire to heal the differences of 1912.

Revis H. Post said he came to see Roosevelt to ask him to write Dr. Brazill for a supply of his famous snakebite serum. Dr. Brazill has a snake farm in Brazil. The serum is widely known. Post wants it for friends with the American forces in Mexico.

HUGHES WAITS FOR BULL MOOSE TO ACT

Nominee Will Not Name National Chairman for Few Days.

NEW YORK, June 25.—Charles E. Hughes won't name a campaign manager, it was learned yesterday, until he hears from the Progressives how they will set a day for the notification ceremonies.

In one case, as in the other, his selection may be influenced in part by the action which the Progressives will take. The Progressive national committee, which meets in Chicago tomorrow to act on Theodore Roosevelt's letter withdrawing in favor of Hughes, is expected to substitute Hughes for Roosevelt on its Presidential ticket.

It may wish to participate in the notification ceremonies, though there is a chance it will decide for a separate notification day of its own.

In any event, it is said, Hughes' decision to wait on his action is a compliment which Progressive voters the country over hardly can fail to appreciate.

Before Hughes left the city for Bridgehampton, L. I., he was asked if he expected to confer with any one today.

"Only with my chief adviser," he said. There was a second of tense interest among the newspaper men; they were to learn the name of the one person who, next to the candidate, would be the great factor in the campaign.

"Mrs. Hughes," the Presidential nominee added, with a smile and a gracious infection of tone that emphasized his compliment to the woman destined, in the opinion of some millions of voters, to be the "first lady in the land."
