Why Acids Sometimes Are Most Valuable As Medical Remedies

PERHAPS as good a way as any to explode the ingrained myths about "acid foods" and "acid in the blood" and all the other fond delusions, about "uric acid" and "acidity" is to explain how acids are sometimes used as remedies. The chief acids administered as medicines are the mineral acids, hydrochloric, sulphuric, nitric, and phosphoric, the first two of which are also known by the names muriatic acid and oil of vitriol; and the non-mineral, organic acids, acetic acid, or vinegar, tartaric acid in grape juice and citric acid in lemon juice.

Other Acid Medicines. Nitric acid is relied upon by some physicians to obliterate bad breath, bile, belching and other symptoms traceable to the gall bladder and liver. Together with muriatic acid as nitrohydrochloric acid it is given for gall stones, jaundice, excess of oxalic acid in the urine, and other ailments.
