


Gilroy Goes Back To Hilltop Second Team

Georgetown's 1915 Star Displaced By Coach Exendine In Favor of McQuade, Newcomer—Neil Cronin Has Torn Ligament In Shoulder.

Placing Johnny Gilroy, brightest star of the 1915 eleven, on the second team and giving his position on the varsity to McQuade, the freshman halfback whose forward pass brought a touchdown for Georgetown against the Navy, was the most notable act of Coach Exendine at the Hilltop yesterday.

Not liking the change much, Gilroy played wonderful football with the scrubs and may be back with the varsity before long. He was pitted against McQuade and the two fought up and down the field like a pair of wildcats. Owing to slight injuries, neither "Fetie" Wall nor "Dutch" Leighty were in the line-up, their places being filled by Jim O'Boyle and Whelan, two promising freshmen. Jackie Maloney remained in his place at quarterback.

Neil Cronin, a strong candidate for an end berth, is out of the game with a torn ligament in his shoulder. He has been ordered to rest until all soreness leaves his shoulder and may not be able to play before next week.

Georgetown is losing the services of O'Brien, the giant guard from Tulane University, because of his poor physical condition. O'Brien tips the beam around 300 pounds, but he is soft from lack of hard work, and is therefore unable to show at his best. With the Hilltoppers casting about for good line material, O'Brien is losing an excellent chance of making the team by his failure to harden himself.
