Referee and Umpire Selected by Advisers—Field Judge Selection Deferred.

Hunter McGuire, former Harvard line-man, who officiated last fall, has been picked as umpire, following the first annual meeting of the board of athletic advisers at Technical High School.

The selection of the field judge was deferred until a later date. John A. Dugan and John C. Hagar, were mentioned as possible selections. The business of the series was held off until tomorrow afternoon, when it will be learned what disposition Manager Griffith has made of the use of the baseball park for the annual series.


