

### SOCIETY WOMEN TO STUMP FOR WILSON

Mrs. Charles Dana Gibson and Miss Constance Drexel Lead Campaign.

Led by Mrs. Charles Dana Gibson, known the world over for her beauty, and Miss Constance Drexel, of Philadelphia, members of the Women's Bureau, of the Democratic national committee, will make a whirlwind campaign of New York city in favor of the re-election of President Wilson.

The campaign will open Thursday evening, October 11, with a dinner at the Hotel McAlpin. Mrs. Gibson will make the principal address.

This will not be the first time Mrs. Gibson has taken the stump for President Wilson. During his campaign in 1912 she toured the country, making speeches in all the larger cities.

Mrs. Gibson is the wife of the famous artist and is a sister of Mrs. William Waldorf Astor and Mrs. Reginald Brooks. Before their marriages the sisters were known as the Langhorne beauties.

"If you want peace you want Wilson," Miss Constance Drexel, of Philadelphia, says in her contribution to the Democratic national textbook, the only article in the record of the Democratic Administration written by a woman.

Miss Drexel, who is a member of the Women's Bureau, of the Democratic national committee, also says that women suffer most from war.

"Men are killed," she writes, "but the women live on, robbed of home and protected motherhood, compelled to shoulder burdens not intended for them."

Miss Drexel is a member of the Drexel family, of Philadelphia. She is one of the hard-working women for Wilson in the country. In the whirlwind campaign of New York city to be undertaken by the Women's Bureau, of the Democratic national committee, Miss Drexel is scheduled to make several speeches.

### MRS. RHODES ASKS MORE PLAYGROUNDS

Superintendent Recommends Additions and Improvements In Annual Report.

"Establishment of additional playgrounds until there will be one accessible to every child in the District," is the recommendation of Mrs. Susie Root Rhodes, supervisor of playgrounds in her annual report to the Commission for the fiscal year ended June 30.

"When a city makes it illegal to play in the streets it should provide places where play may not only be lawful, but encouraged," says Mrs. Rhodes.

Among her recommendations are the following: "That every playground have either a swimming pool or a wading pool provided.

"That the wider use of the school plan, in connection with playground activities be encouraged by all workers.

"That shelter houses or open-air halls be provided on all grounds now in operation. The summers are so hot and the winters are so cold that unless we provide against these extremes of climate, much time will be lost in the outdoor life of our children.

"That the playgrounds be lighted and open evenings.

"That moving picture apparatus be purchased for all lighted grounds.

"That the shops of the elementary schools be open in summer vacation so the children attending the playgrounds near by may have elementary woodwork and simple carpentry. The repairing of broken furniture and toys would be good occupational play.

"That school kitchens be open in summer vacation and nearby playground children be given cooking lessons as an occupational recreation."

The total attendance at the playgrounds during the year was 1,041,774 and the daily average attendance, 2,850. The attendance at the bathing beach was 78,966 white and 8,668 colored.

### ANACOSTIA CITIZENS SEEK ARMOR PLANT

Association Indorses Campaign of Washington Civic Organizations.

Reasons for the location of the proposed Government armor plant in the District of Columbia were discussed, and a resolution indorsing the campaign of Washington civic organizations to bring the plant here was adopted at a meeting of the Anacostia Citizens' Association last night. The steel plant at Giesboro Point was cited as an example of the benefits which might be reaped by the community.

Charles R. Burr, chairman of the committee on schools, reported that several improvements had been made at the Van Buren School during the summer, and upon his recommendation, the Board of Education will be asked to make more, including a renewal of the floor in the basement of the school.

A letter was read from the local authorities stating that a sea wall was not contemplated on the west side of the Anacostia river from the Navy Yard to the Anacostia Bridge.

Maurice Otterback, chairman of the committee on streets and highways, reported that several improvements to streets in the suburbs had been ordered.
