Three hundred and seventy candidates for Congress this year have gone on record as favoring the Federal amendment for woman suffrage.

Only thirty-six Congressional candidates have expressed unfavorable opinions. The candidates in their replies express many personal opinions which, according to Miss Ruth White, secretary of the Congressional committee, show there is more real interest in woman suffrage among politicians this year than ever before in the history of the country.

INQUIRY IS ORDERED OF GARBAGE SYSTEM

Mt. Pleasant Citizens Name Committee in New Plant Agitation.

The Mt. Pleasant Citizens Association has named a committee to investigate the system used by the District in the destruction of garbage.

Members charged that the District now removes only such refuse from homes as can be easily destroyed or sold, and such articles as green grass, leaves, small sticks and glass are left to the property owner to dispose of at his own expense.

Those appointed on the committee are David D. Caldwell, Richard B. Watrous, George B. Selden, Arthur D. Call, George H. Markward, William Henry White, Dr. H. B. Cobey and Dr. A. J. McKelvey.

While not directly in favor of the amendment, some of the members suggested that only fair that a tax on street improvement be levied on the District property owners at a similar rate as is imposed on citizens of other cities of the United States.

Other business taken up at the meeting last night was the decision regarding the holding of social meetings at every other session, a resolution calling on the District Commissioners to include in their annual budget to Congress expenses sufficient to cover the cost of opening Lamont street west from Nineteenth street to Park road.

DEATH TOLL HEAVY AT SOLDIERS' HOME

Board of Commissioners Makes Report to Secretary of War Baker.

Death exacted a heavy toll at the Soldiers' Home during the last fiscal year, according to the report of the board of commissioners of the home to Secretary of War Baker.

The net expense of the home for the year was \$62,834.54, which was \$10,641 more than the preceding year.

Of the 502 acres in the Soldiers' Home reservation, 100 acres are under cultivation. The seventy-eight cows in the famous herd of Holsteins advanced in value from \$26,542 to \$41,040.

The report shows the veterans at the home are well supplied with amusements with five motion picture performances a week, three band concerts, gymnasium, pool, billiards, chess, checkers, cards and golf.
