URGES NEW BRIDGE AT CALVERT STREET

Board of Trade Committee Makes Other Recommendations in Its Annual Report.

Advocacy of a sufficient appropriation to begin the replacement of the present Calvert street bridge with a structure which will meet the requirements of conditions of traffic, is contained in the annual report of the Board of Trade committee on bridges, approved at a meeting of the entire committee. The report also asks that Congress appropriate \$2,000 for the repair of small bridges in the District, and that an appropriation be made for a viaduct over the railroad tracks in the vicinity of South Dakota avenue northeast to eliminate the grade crossing at Landon, D. C. The report suggests that the viaduct be placed at Central avenue, and states that the structure can be built for from \$45,000 to \$50,000.
