CHIEF MEYERS TO LCSE UBB BECAUSE HE HEADED REVOLT

Brooklyn Club Will Figure in Trade for Younger Catcher for Next Season.

SALARIES TO BE LOWERED

Magnates Plan to Reduce Contracts All Along Line Before Another Campaign.

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—Chief Meyers may not wear a Brooklyn uniform again next season. The famous Indian backstop is said to be a deflator with the powers that be over at Ebbets Field. He slowed down in his play this year and was frequently injured. Furthermore, it is said that the chief did not make a hit with his employers when he openly found fault with the sale of world's series tickets in Boston and Brooklyn.

In spite of rumors that the players will stick together in a demand for salaries named in many of the long-term contracts which have just expired, the magnates are determined to reduce the figures all along the line. The average club owner will tell you that, in his opinion, the players have been receiving too much money. The heavy losses sustained in many of the long-term contracts since the Federal League became active two years ago, have prompted a desire to retrench.

George Hamilton Shines as Kicker Washington Boy in Marine Corps Cinches Championship.

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—Four field goals, all from placement, kicked by Lieutenant of Marines George Hamilton, yesterday afternoon gave the football Arkansas the football championship of the first division of the Atlantic coast. In the playoff a scoreless tie with the men from the battleship Texas, at the Brooklyn Athletic Club field, the eleven from the Arkansas triumphed by 12 to 0.

Hamilton comes from Washington, D. C., where he was known as one of the best schoolboy football players of his day. Hamilton kicked two of his goals in the second quarter, one from the 20 and the other from the 22-yard line. The third came in the third quarter from the 27-yard line. Hamilton followed with the fourth from the 44-yard line. He still always held the ball. Hamilton tried a fifth from the 48-yard line in the fourth period, but a poor kick was responsible for a blocked kick.


"Beat Georgetown." Is Slogan of Fordhamites

WILL HE BAG THAT GAME TODAY?



Just as Difficult to Roll 100 Flat At Duckpins as to Make a 200 Score

Discussion Among Bowlers Brings Out Interesting Comparison of Two Marks.

A 200 game and a 100 flat game at duckpins are on a par so far as difficulty in rolling them is concerned, was the outcome of an argument the other day at the Grand Central. When rolling up the two it is found that 200 has never been rolled here and 100 flat achieved only once. The latter performance is accredited 'Tip O'Neill, who knocked 'em all down without a spare in a Knights of Columbus match several seasons ago.

O'Neill's record was not altogether perfect, but could be called a legitimate 100 flat. In one of the boxes he got all ten pins with two balls, but fouled on his second and was forced to take a third shot, which again cleaned the boards.

To roll a century flat is almost necessary to make thirty accurate shots, and to make 200 is very nearly twice as many. Incidentally, Baer's team gathered 1,576 pins and won three games.

Some doubt is held here that the proposed interstate tenpin organization, which probably will be formed at a meeting in Baltimore Monday, will be successful. An effort was made to organize a league with representative teams of Washington, Baltimore, and Richmond some years ago, but the bowlers were none too interested to travel from one city to another for matches. However, this system may not be used by the proposed association. The bowlers may roll at home and send their scores by mail.

A. Works, of the Raftery team, has the best average of the Columbia League, with 166-8 for nine games. SCHOOLBOY GAMES PROVE ATTRACTIVE

Central Plays Baltimore, A. N. P. Meeting Georgetown Preps.

By BRYAN MORSE. Georgetown Preps will battle with the Army and Navy Preps today for the preparatory school championship as a prelude to the George Washington-Ursinus game on the Hilltop.

Central stands a fair chance of triumphing over the Baltimore lads, as they have met and defeated the Baltimore Polys, titleholders of the Monumental City. Coach Metzier is expecting to use the same team that defeated Business on Tuesday. The City College team has not met defeat this season.

At the meeting of the high school athletic committee held yesterday after the Western-Technical game, it was decided to allow any boys who have seen service in the national guard to be brought into the football series provided they are eligible in scholarship standing.

There is a rule in the high school athletic code which prohibits participation in football after October 15. As service with the guard is compulsory it was decided to make eligible any athletes who have just returned from the border.

Johnny Saxon, captain of the Central eleven, who has just returned with the Maryland squad, will therefore be eligible to compete with his team. Western gains a notable addition to the football team in Eugene Stevens, who was on the second eleven last fall.

For the second time in the history of scholastic football and for the first time in eleven years Western defeated Tech in football. The score was 12 to 0 and appears to be a true measure of the relative strength of the two teams.

In 1905 when Robert Phelan was captain of Western Tech was handed a 12-0 defeat. Western's football championship that year. Yesterday's game was a typical high school contest with little team struggling against a beefy individual who seems unable to realize what was going on. Tech, on the first play of the game, rushed forward through a couple of line plunges, Wright going over.

Western braced considerably thereafter and was able to stop Tech's efforts at scoring. As the game went on the Western grew getting stronger and stronger and more confident. At the start of the second half the youngsters from across the creek scored on a neat forward pass, O'Brien to Hume, a couple of line plunges, Wright going over.

On even terms Western's defense proved a revelation. The eleven played whirlwind football against their heavier opponents and succeeded in blocking Tech's every effort to tackle plays. They were neatly applied and the small Western linemen completely backed up their opponents. In the final quarter O'Brien threw a 25-yard pass to Hume for a forty-five yard and a touchdown. Tech was beaten to a standstill in the final quarter and was able to score only one glimmering when John Davidson forward passed to Simpson for final score.

Western made nine first downs to Tech's eight, five of them being on forward passes. Wright averaged thirty-seven yards in seven punts, while Snyder averaged thirty in six punts. O'Brien ran back punts for an average of twenty yards, while Snyder got back for six only on the average.

Out of eight forward passes attempted by Western, six were successful. The yardage scored for Western on forward passes was eighty-two. Tech tried five forward, only one of which went forward for a gain of four yards. One of Tech's forward passes was intercepted.

BUFF AND BLUE TO FACE URSINUS TEAM AT HILLTOP TODAY

Visitors Have Fast Eleven and Are Favored to Win From Downtown Boys.

By LOUIS A. DOUGHER. George Washington today tackles the toughest opponent it has yet faced. Ursinus being the eleven to battle the Buff and Blue. This game will be played at Georgetown Field, starting at 3 o'clock, and should attract a large crowd interested in the rejuvenation of the great college sport at Washington.

Ursinus has a fast eleven capable of showing a high class style of football. It is coached by Wesley Gerges, an alumnus, and its record so far this season is most commendable for a small team.

Lehigh trimmed Ursinus in the opening games of the season, 21 to 0, but the Collegeville lads walloped Washington college, 63 to 0, a week later. Lafayette was the next team to feel the weight of the Ursinus attack, losing a 6 to 0 game. That is the best Ursinus has done this year. Dickinson won, 3 to 4, and last Saturday Swarthmore, as yet undefeated, hung up a victory, 13 to 2.

George Washington will hardly today attempt more than to hold down the Pennsylvanians, seeking a field goal if coming close enough to the enemy's crossbar. Coach Sullivan has a good line, especially for defensive purposes, but his backfield is not up to standard of the forwards. The Buff and Blue is steadily improving, but it is all uphill work, and it will take another year to make a machine rounded in every department.

Georgetown has no game scheduled for today. Next Tuesday the Hilltoppers will meet Fordham at New York. This is New York's biggest election day yet and fully 12,000 spectators are expected to witness the clash for the Jout title of the East. The Georgetown squad will leave Monday afternoon for the metropolis, returning immediately after the game.

Many Washingtonians will go over to Annapolis today for the two games scheduled there. The Middies are playing Washington and Lee, while Maryland State is engaged with St. John's in the first of the season's games for the Maryland championship.

The Brooklanders have a hard game on their hands with V. M. I. at Lexington, Va. The cadets have a strong line and a strong backfield. St. John's follows if it manages to bring home a victory. Gallaudet is expected to defeat Penn Military College at Chester, Pa. The soldiers are broken up by injuries and it is doubtful if they will play. Fordham last week on that account.
