NAVY COMMITTEE TO BEGIN STUDY SOON

Special Investigating Committee Leaves This Week.

The special commission, headed by Rear Admiral J. M. Helm, investigating the question of establishing new navy yards or naval bases on the Pacific coast and in the Gulf of Mexico, and aviation and submarine bases on

the Atlantic, Pacific, and Gulf coasts, will leave Washington this week. The naval appropriation bill appropriated \$10,000 for the investigation. The commission will report before the close of the coming session of Congress. Its members, in addition to Admiral Helm, are Chief Constructor W. L. Capps, Civil Engineer, H. H. Rousseau, Capt. O. W. McElroy, and Comdr. C. L. Hussey, all of the navy. Chief Yeoman J. M. Lieber and W. K. Beecher will accompany the commission.

LEAVES BEQUESTS TO CHURCH INSTITUTIONS

Will of Mrs. Rose Melling Filed In Probate Here.

The will of Mrs. Rose Melling, dated August 24, 1914, which was filed for probate in District Supreme Court yesterday contains bequests of \$1,000 to St. Vincent's Orphan Asylum, \$500 to St. Ann's Orphan Asylum, \$500 to the Little Sisters

of the Poor, and a similar amount to the St. Vincent de Paul Society. The Rev. Eugene Hannan is given \$500 for masses, and \$500 for the new St. Martin's Church. George Melling, a son, and Mary A. and Marie Regina Melling, daughters, are each given \$500. Ida Melling, another daughter, known as Sister Rose Loretta, is given \$200 and Rose E. Mangin, a fourth daughter, is bequeathed a similar amount. Bequests of \$50 are made to each of three nieces of the testatrix. The residue of the property is then left to Mary A. and Marie Regina Melling, who with George Melling, are named executors.

Will of Henry L. Gosling.

The will of Henry L. Gosling, dated April 1, 1890, and filed for probate yesterday, leaves \$50 a month to the testator's aunt, Margaret S. Gosling, during her life, and the residue to the estate to the wife, Sarah Pauline Gosling, who is also named executrix.
