

HYPHEN VOTE SPLIT IN MOST STATES IN RECENT ELECTION

German-Americans Acted Together in Only a Few Communities Last Tuesday.

NEW YORK, Nov. 12.—The hyphen vote, which was expected to do such great things, failed to accomplish them, for different reasons in different States. In some States it was because the German-Americans refused to follow their leaders, and voted for Wilson or Hughes, according to their ancient party predilections, or for other reasons, just as other men did. In other States the German-Americans followed their leaders so ostentatiously as to arouse the wrath of other Americans in much larger numbers, and these other Americans voted for Wilson.

In one State, Maryland, they turned Democrat, and there they voted for Wilson for hyphenal reasons. In other States they put their prosperity above their allegiance to the Fatherland; one such State was Illinois. In others they were too few to accomplish anything.

Split in Wisconsin.
The German vote in Wisconsin did not stick together, though Hughes gained 12,000 votes in twelve German counties. In six typical Scandinavian counties Wilson gained 1,938 over his vote four years ago, while Hughes lost 1,274 behind the Republican vote, giving the President a net advantage of 3,177.

What They Did in Maryland.
In Maryland the Germans voted for Wilson. He got not only the German Democrats, but a large majority of the German Republicans. The German vote in Maryland is about 40,000, of whom from 25,000 to 30,000 are in Baltimore city.

The rest are mostly in the western counties, which include Hagerstown, Frederick City, and Cumberland. About a third of the German vote, particularly in Baltimore city, is normally Democratic and the rest Republican.

No Effect in St. Louis.
Instead of losing the German vote in Missouri, the Democrats actually made gains.

In the Counties.
In the two counties, St. Charles and Gasconade, where the population is largely German, the vote again followed party lines with a majority for Wilson.

300 BOYS TO RACE IN Y. M. C. A. MARATHON

William E. Fowler Donates Medals for Winners of Thanksgiving Event.

Three hundred boys to compete for prizes in the annual Thanksgiving marathon of the boys' department of the Y. M. C. A. That is the desire and expectation of those in charge.

For several years these marathons have been getting more and more popular among the youth of the city, and this year they are understood to be looking forward with great interest to the event.

E. J. Fuller, physical director for boys of the Y. M. C. A., has taken charge of the race, and is pushing it every minute in the month of October to last year. There will be no entrance fee this year. This is due to the generosity of William E. Fowler, of the Y. M. C. A., who has donated the medals of gold, silver, and bronze, for the two races.

There will be two different races, for boys of different ages and weights. The first race, which will start in front of the Y. M. C. A. building at 10 o'clock Thanksgiving morning, will consist of all boys in the District of Columbia under fifteen years of age and weighing less than 110 pounds.

The second race, which is to be started a half hour later, is open to boys between the ages of fifteen and nineteen, and there is no weight limit.

Those in charge of arrangements have already taken steps to lay out the route of the races. Last year some confusion was experienced from mix-ups in the line of march. It was planned to obviate any possibility of such occurring this year.

The "line of march" for the youngsters will be: Start in front of the Y. M. C. A.; run a block down G street to Eighteenth street; from Eighteenth street to the Park-American building; from there up Seventeenth; then back through G street and to the Y. M. C. A. building again. The length of this run is a mile.

The older boys will leave the front of the "Y" at 10:30, and run from G street to Seventeenth street, thence to the John Paul Jones Monument, then swing east around the Ellipse, out back of the White House, State, War and Navy building, along F street, back to Eighteenth street. Eighteenth street to G street, and there to the starting point, a total distance of two miles.

Blankets for these races can be obtained either at the Y. M. C. A. from Mr. Fuller, or at Spalding Broad sporting goods store, 1414 G street. It is expected that there will be a great rush for them shortly.
