## MIKE MARTIN VISITS AUGUSTA SEARCHING FOR TRAINING CAMP

Griffmen's Trainer Today, Accompanied by Ty Cobb, Looks at Situation.

### GEORGIA PEACH INTERESTED

Many Washingtonians Spend Winter in Georgia and May Effect the Matter.

The Griffmen will train next spring at Augusta, Ga., home of Ty Cobb, if Mike Martin decides that accommodations are suitable.

Mike Martin, the Griffmen's alert and capable trainer, is today in Augusta under orders to inspect the baseball diamond, the facilities for bathing and the hotels. If he returns with a favorable report, the Washington club will do its preliminary work in Augusta. If he decides against the proposition, Manager Griffith will make arrangements elsewhere else.

Ty Cobb is most anxious to have the Washington club get into shape in his own town, as he will thus be able to enjoy a few workouts himself with the Griffmen before reporting to Hugh Jennings. The "Georgia Peach" most willingly offered to escort Martin around the town, showing him all the facilities for a big league training quarters.

The Washington club has been plagued with offers of training camps ever since it became generally known in the South that the team would not return to Charlottesville, Va., where it has done its spring work for five years. Augusta's offer is the first which Manager Griffith has taken seriously enough to send a representative to make investigations, and it is probable that he will take his team there next spring.

Many Washingtonians go to Augusta every winter, remaining through March to play golf, and this may have some bearings on the situation.

## Moguls Plan Defense Against the Players

"We Will Close Our Ball Parks Before Submitting to Conditions That Are Intolerable," Says One Magnate, Speaking of Situation.

NEW YORK, Nov. 18.—Following the action of the minor leagues in refusing to consider several demands filed with them by the Baseball Players Fraternity, comes the hint that there may be a general strike by the men who drew salaries for displaying their skill on the diamond. While it is hard to believe that the players will resort to such tactics, it can be said without fear of contradiction that the leaders of organized baseball are prepared to meet the issue with a fight.

The major league magnates insist that their players have no grievances of vital importance. The minor league men maintain that their men also have been well treated. Organized baseball, as a unit, is determined to put an end to the players' demands and threats for all time.

Will Close Parks.

"If the players decide to go on strike we will not try to stop them," said a big baseball man yesterday. "The ball parks will be kept closed next spring if a majority of the players do not sign contracts. We can stand a battle as long as the fraternity, but we do not believe that the average player, after a winter diet of snowballs, will care to remain idle with no salary for any great length of time."

The club owners in the majors and minors have been losing money ever since the Federal League was disbanded three years ago. The players helped the Feds to kill popular interest in the sport. They either jumped to the position or held up for exorbitant salaries. We have lived up to the terms of all ironclad contracts, regardless of financial losses, and it is about time to have the game break in our favor."

Braves Hurt Sport.

"Baseball received a black eye last season because of the behavior of some of the big league players. The disorderly conduct of the Braves, for instance, hurt the sport considerably. The indifference of some of the Giants in the final series with Brooklyn was another hard knock."

"On top of this was the bad playing and faint-heartedness of the Robins in the world's series, which deprived close their fans of the pleasure of popularity and prestige. The barnstorming trips and the squabbling over the world's series spoils did additional harm, yet the players in the big leagues received higher salaries, collectively, than for many years."

Will Fight to Finish.

"If there is a strike, therefore, the club owners will fight the players to a finish. Organized baseball cannot afford to surrender to them. If the men who pay salaries and overhead charges cannot run the sport without dictation from the ball field, they'll close their gates until the players realize that they cannot hold the whip hand. Ballplayers are paid more liberally than athletes in other branches of sport, and quite a number of them, easy, and they must be made to understand that they cannot control the pastime."

## GERGETOWN TAKES ON NORTH CAROLINA A. AND M. ELEVEN

Students Will March From Law School to Field Before Big Football Game.

Georgetown's victorious varsity eleven today faces North Carolina A. and M. in what is considered the biggest home game of the season at the Hilltop. The West Enders will rally to the support of the gladiators in noble fashion, parading in the business district to the field behind a brass band and waving banners and to the marching songs of the old Blue and Gray.

At 2 o'clock the hosts of Georgetown will gather at the Law School and march to the field across Rock Creek. It is believed that more than a thousand students will be in the stands for the first time in the history of the school. The faculty has granted a half-holiday for the students to attend an athletic contest.

Hopes to Make Amends.

Georgetown today hopes to make some amends for its lone defeat at the hands of the Middle by running up a higher score against the Raleigh eleven than did the sailor boys a week ago. To do this, though, they will have to better their own record. This will be a difficult task, as the Aggies have not been wasting their time in the past season. Georgetown for this contest, hoping to hold the Blue and Gray to a low score.

The four games between Georgetown and North Carolina A. and M. Of the three already played, two have been victories for the Hilltoppers. Last season Georgetown found the Raleigh lads tough customers, and won, 28 to 0, after a hard-fought contest. Today, however, the home team's supporters look for a far higher score.

Georgetown's eleven is well nigh perfect in the style of play, as taught by Coach Exendine. No better instance is shown by any eleven in the country. It is the equal of the Pittsburger Aggies. Exendine was long a pupil of Glenn Warner and he has taught the Hilltoppers the same style.

With Johnny Gilroy and McQuade to run the ball behind a perfect wall of Interferers, Georgetown expects to run the season. Georgetown's Washington has long heard of the prowess of Gilroy, whose work featured the Hilltop game earlier in the season. Today the capital has a champion, the little wonder at his best. He will be unleashed to do as he wills.

The Aggies have at least two first class players in their line-up. Captain McDougal, the former Exeter star, is back again at his old place on the left wing. In the backfield, an old Andover end, is playing quarterback for the Aggies. This pair, if given the proper support, may be expected to tear off forward passes that will prove troublesome for the Hilltoppers.

May Cause Trouble.

Homestead, playing tackle against Captain O'Connor, is in the backfield this season. This year he is doing well as a forward, and may give the Blue and Gray star plenty of work to keep him out of the fray. Georgetown has a heavier team all around than its opponent. The huge Hilltop forwards will probably jump over the Aggie line. In the backfield, there is little difference in the weight, though the home backs may be a bit heavier.

Both elevens are expected to use the forward pass frequently. The Aggies will use it because of lack of weight to advance the ball through the husky Georgetown line. The home eleven will use it to vary its attack. Georgetown's running game should be shown at its best with Gilroy, Wall, and McQuade tearing loose off the tackles and around the ends at the first opportunity.

Muhlenberg is Here.


