Election Uncertainty Mirrored in Market

Extreme Nervousness Apparent Among Traders, Especially During Early Days of Week—Metal Groups Show Remarkable Strength.

Uncertainty over the outcome of the Presidential election was clearly mirrored in the stock market during the past week. Especially during the early days of the week, extreme nervousness was apparent, and from Monday until Thursday there was no definite tendency in the course of prices.
