DEAR SUSAN: How tongues have been wagging in Washington this week! First the suffragettes' picketing program—and the President's humorous invitation to the half frozen sentinels to come inside and partake of hot coffee and sandwiches.

Then the tempest in a teapot, which centers about the Playhouse and finally the announcement that the President would not speak at St. John's centennial as had been set forth in the invitations sent out by the vestry.
