ART TREASURES OF SPANISH KING HERE

Rare Tapestries to Be Placed on Exhibition at Corcoran Gallery Tomorrow. A collection of twenty-five old tapestries, lent by the King of Spain, will be placed on exhibition at the Corcoran Gallery of Art tomorrow, to remain more than a week.

Most of the tapestries are more than 300 years old, and were lent to the trustees of the Hispanic Society of America. This is the first time the tapestry work has ever left the royal palace of the Pardo since their completion from the original cartoons in the eighteenth century. The tapestries were made at the Royal Manufactory at Madrid. They are in the personal charge of the Marquis of Valverde. The larger number are modeled from the designs by Francisco Goya and others.

Historical interest in itself is enough to make the tapestries worth examining. They were made for decorations in the castles of Spanish kings, when that country was the richest and most prosperous on earth.

LECTURER DENIES WAR AFFECTS ART

Miss Mary Kirkup Addresses Women's Alliance of All Souls' Unitarian Church. Belief that war exercises any effect on the painting of an age is absurd and not justified by history, said Miss Mary Kirkup, before the women's alliance of All Souls' Unitarian Church, Fourteenth and L streets northwest, today. Miss Kirkup lectured on "The Liberal Movement in Art."

The speaker declared war and art are far apart. She denied that war has a baneful effect on art. War has no effect on music, she said, so why on art?

Defends Post-Impressionists. Miss Kirkup defended the post-impressionist movement, but denied that American artists are copying from the French in this respect. Originality is to be found everywhere in the work of American masters, she observed, and artists on this side the ocean have modified cubist pictures to a great extent.

"Art is not related to daily life," said Miss Kirkup. "By that I mean our daily actions are not reflected in art. It is not representative of the life of the time."

"Art since the sixteenth century has interpreted spiritual life. It rises and falls, and each new idea in art brings an enthusiasm all its own."

Art's Spiritual Effect. Miss Evelyn Hale discussed art's effect on spiritual life. She told the life story of William Morris Hunt, described as one of America's greatest artists. Miss Hale, a pupil of the celebrity, reviewed his successes and compared his work with that of modern day painters.

The Rev. Abraham Ribbans, an Armenian, who is pastor of a Unitarian church in Boston, will make an address at All Souls' Church April 12 on "The Wise Men of the East and the Wise Men of the West."

EMPLOYMENT FOR GIRLS

Commissioner Caminetti Will Assist Women's Organization. Commissioner of Immigration Caminetti will lay plans before a meeting of women's organizations in the Public Library this afternoon for the organization here of a District employment agency, with special emphasis on the work of securing positions for girls over fifteen years old.

Heretofore, it is stated, the Department of Labor, co-operating with citizens' employment agencies throughout the United States, has devoted all its time to the work of securing positions for men. Women heretofore have only been a side issue in this respect.

Should the Washington women form the employment agency for girls, following the meeting this afternoon, they will be among the first in the United States to follow the example of the Department of Labor in paying the way for wider employment of women in the United States.

FILMS TO SHOW LATIN.

Scenes in South America and America's insular possessions will be shown in motion pictures at the American University tomorrow afternoon at 3 o'clock. The university is showing a series of educational films each Saturday.
